


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

P R E F A C E.

HAVING frequently experienced, in my early practice, the want of a publication like the present, it is natural to suppose there are many others, who must sometimes feel a similar inconvenience or disadvantage. To such medical practitioners, then, this little manual is chiefly offered; and to such, I trust, it will not prove altogether unacceptable. It may serve at least, often, to supply the exigencies of the moment, and may even save, on some occasions, the trouble of referring to larger works.

It will be perceived, that I have followed the example of Dr. Latham, in marking the proper and established measure of several words. This, it is obvious, has not been done without reason, since the pronunciation of some even of our most common technical terms is sometimes, either from ignorance or custom, barbarously perverted.

That I stand entitled equally to indulgence, in having also subjoined to a number of words their respective genders and genitive cases, may, indeed, be doubted. To the young physician, however, who happens, as yet, to be familiar with but few

of the several medicinal substances employed, those additions cannot fail of being acceptable; especially when he considers the timely aid, which, on certain occasions, they may be found capable of affording.

With regard to the doses of medicines, it is proper to remark, that they are meant for adults where the contrary is not particularly expressed. Hence for children a reduction of the quantity specified will be necessary, proportioned to their different ages; to which, perhaps, some practitioners may find themselves inadequate, without some general rule or principle to direct their calculation. For the use of such, therefore, a suitable table has been drawn up, and prefixed to this work, as will be immediately hereafter seen. But this, it is to be understood, is intended only to supply the deficiency now mentioned; the circumstances attending diseases being often such as will render deviations requisite, for which no sufficient rules can conveniently be given, and which therefore must be left to the skill, judgment, and observation of the prescriber.

THE following TABLE is designed to shew the doses of medicines proper for persons of different ages: thus suppose one dram of any medicine a sufficient dose for an adult, that is, for one of twenty-one years of age, then other ages will require as follow.

EXPLANATIONS.

1. Those articles and preparations, to which the Italic capital *L.* is subjoined, are inserted in the London pharmacopeia, but not in the Edinburgh; those, to which *E.* is subjoined, are to be found in the Edinburgh pharmacopeia, but not in the London; and such as have no distinguishing mark, though taken from the pharmacopeia of the London college, may be considered as common to both.
2. The small Roman letters, enclosed within a parenthesis, denote the gender and genitive case of the word immediately preceding.
3. The Italic capital *P.* annexed to some of the fluid ingredients in the officinal compositions, signifies, that the quantities of such fluid articles are ordered to be adjusted by weight, after the same manner as solids, and not by measure, as is the case of fluids in other instances.

A BRÖTÖNUM, (i, n.) *folium*. Southernwood. Tonic, slightly aromatic, 3j ad 3j, bis terve die. In infusion 3j to water lbj. In clysters vermifuge.

ABSINTHIUM (ii, n.) MARITIMUM, *cacumen*. Sea wormwood. L. Tonic, stomachic, 3j ad 3j. See Cons. Externally in fomentations discutient. See Deco^t. - In strength this is much inferior to common wormwood.

ABSINTHIUM VULGARE, *herba*. Common wormwood. Tonic, stomachic, 3j ad 3ij. In infusion 3vj to water lbj. In clysters vermifuge. In fomentations discutient, antiseptic.

ACETOSA (x, f.) PRATENSIS, *folium*. Meadow-forrel. Cooling, restringent, juice 3j ad 3ij, bis terve die.

ACETUM, (i, n.) Vinegar. Cooling, antiseptic, diaphoretic; in bilious fevers, singultus, &c. 3j ad 3fs. See Syr. Externally cooling, astringent. Vinegar, proof spir. each lbs, alum 3ij, form a good

application for chilblains, and for certain diseases of the knee and other joints.

ACĒTUM AROMATĪCUM. E. (*Rorismarini, salviæ, sing. ʒij; lavendulæ ʒj; caryoph. aromat. ʒj; aceti vini, p. libv.*) Macerate four days, and filter the expressed liquor thro' paper.) Antiseptic.—This is an elegant improvement of what has been long known under the name of *Thieves Vinegar*.

ACĒTUM DISTILLĀTUM. Virtues as common vinegar.

ACĒTUM SCILLÆ. (*Scill. recens exsic. ʒj; aceti ʒj; spir. vin. ten. ʒʒ.*) Attenuant, expectorant, diuretic, gt. xv ad gt. ix.

ACĪDUM ACETŌSUM. L. Antiseptic, &c. ʒj ad ʒj. This is radical vinegar as it is called, and is often used for smelling to in faintings.

ACĪDUM MURIĀTĪCUM. Stimulant, corroborant, antiseptic, diuretic, gt. x ad gt. xl, properly diluted. Also to acidulate gargles, gt. xxx in lbs; and by way of injection, gt. viij to water ʒiv, in cases of gonorrhœa where the scalding of the urine proves troublesome. Common salt ʒfs, water ʒiv, muriatic acid ʒij,—of this a tea-spoonful or two taken in a glass of water, Dr. Cullen says he has found useful in improving appetite, and frequently in stopping vomiting.

ACĪDUM NITRŌSUM. Tonic, diuretic, gt. v ad gt. xx, largely diluted.

ACĪDUM NITRŌSUM DILŪTUM. (*Acidi nitroſi, aquæ diſt. sing. p. libj.*) Virtues as the former; but has little more than a third its strength.

ACIDUM VITRIÖLI AROMATICUM. E. (*Spir. vin.* rect. p. libij; *acidi vitrio.ici*, p. 3vj; *cinnamomi* 3js; *zingiberis* 3j. Drop the acid gradually into the spirit, and digest the mixture with a very gentle heat, in a close vessel, three days, then add the cinnamon and ginger; digest again six days, and filter thro' paper placed in a glass funnel.) Stimulant, stomachic, gt. xv ad gt. xl, or more.

ACIDUM VITRIOLICUM. In the cure of the itch, Dr. Duncan has employed of late hog's lard 3j, mixed with vitriolic acid 3fs, in lieu of sulphur.

ACIDUM VITRIOLICUM DILUTUM. (*Acidi vitriol.* p. 3j; *aquaæ dist.* p. 3vij.) Cooling, astringent, stomachic, gt. xv ad gt. xxx, or more. In chronic eruptions 3fs ad 3ij, or more, ter die, largely diluted in barley decoction, thick gruel, or the like. Also in colliquative sweats it has been given to a great extent. In gargles astringent, antiseptic, gt. xxx ad gt. xl, or more, in lbs.

ACONITUM, (i, n.) *herba*. Blue wolf's-bane. Anodyne, sudorific, acrid, deobstruent; in chronic rheumatism, scrophulous swellings, venereal nodes, amaurosis, &c. in powder gr. fs ad gr. v, or more, bis die; or, tincture made with dried leaves one part to six of proof spir. dose gt. v gradually increased to gt. xl, or more. See *Succus*.

ÆRUGO (gñis, f.) PRÆPÄRATA. Verdigrise. Alternative, tonic, gr. $\frac{1}{2}$ ad gr. $\frac{1}{2}$. Externally detergent, escharotic. See *Oxym.* & *Ung.*

ÆTHER (ēris, m.) VITRIOLICUS. Stimulant, anti-spasmodic, gt. xx ad 3ij. Also externally against

pains of the head, teeth, &c. with or without camphor, which commonly makes it more effectual.

AGARICUS, (i, m.) Agaric of the oak. *E.* Externally to stop haemorrhages. Before being applied, the internal soft part is to be beaten, till it can be easily torn with the fingers.

ALKÖHOL, (lis, n.) Stimulant, &c. 3ss ad 3j, or more. The specific gravity of alkohol is to that of distilled water as ,815 to 1.

ALLIUM, (ii, n.) *radix*. Garlick. Stimulant, expectorant, diuretic; in cold leucophlegmatic habits 3j ad 3ij, or cloves ij ad vj dipped in oil, bis terve die. Externally applied, it inflames and often exulcerates the part.

ALOË (es, f.) **BARBADENSIS**, *succus spissatus*. Barbadoes aloes. Seldom employed; yet Dr. Cullen doubts whether in quality it is any way inferior to the socotrine. It contains, indeed, more resin than the socotrine, and less gum, in which, it is said, the purgative virtue of aloes resides; hence it should seem preferable where but little stimulus is required, and for external purposes.

ALOË (es, f.) **SOCOTRINA**, *succus spissatus*. Cathartic, anthelmintic, gr. x ad 3j. Laxative, emmenagogue, stomachic, gr. ij. ad gr. v, bis die. See *Pil. Pulv. Tincl. & Vinum*.

ALTHAEA, (x, f.) *radix, folium*. Marshmallow. Obtunding, emollient. See *Decoct. & Syr.*

ALUMEN (inis, n.) **PURIFICATUM**. Tonic, astrin-gent; in haemorrhages, colica pictonum, chronic pains

pains of the bowels, enurefis, &c. gr. x ad 3ij. See *Pulv.* To make alum whey, put 3ij of alum to boiling milk 1lbj. Alum 3ij, rose water 3iv, form a good astringent collyrium. A stronger solution of alum, as 3j to water 3iv, is sometimes employed as a discutient, and also with a view of checking the progress of external inflammation.

ALUMEN USTUM. Externally to destroy fungous flesh. Joined with an equal quantity of red nitrated mercury, it forms the *Pulvis angelicus* of the late Mr. Sharp; which, it is said, possesses powers, as an effcharotic, superior to either of those substances separately. Burnt alum differs only from common alum in having the water expelled from it.

AMMONIA PRÆPARATA. (*Olim, Sal vol. sal. amm.*) Antacid, attenuant, stimulant, diaphoretic, antispasmodic, gr. v ad gr. xv, or more, sheathed in some oleaginous fluid. Though prepared ammonia may be made to serve as an uniting medium between oil and water, and is thus usually given, yet in consequence of the large portion of carbonic acid combined with it, it by no means produces so perfect an union as strict neatness requires. When this, therefore, should make a part of the prescriber's intention, a preferable method will be to form an emulsion, by shaking with the oil and water four or five drops of water of pure ammonia, before adding the salt.

AMMONIACUM PURIFICATUM, *gummi-résina*. Acrid, deobstruent, expectorant, antispasmodic, gr. x ad 3js. See *Lac.* Externally discutient, resolvent. See *Emplastrum.*

AMYGDĀLA AMĀRA, & DULCIS, nūcleus. Bitter almond sedative, diuretic; sweet almond demulcent. See *Lac*, & *Oleum*.

AMYLUM, (i, n.) Starch. Demulcent, 3ss ad 3ij. See *Mucil.* & *Troch.*

ANCHŪSA, (æ, f.) radix. Alkanet. *E.* Astringent. Used chiefly in colouring oils, unguents, and plasters.

ANETHUM, (i, n.) semen. Dill. Stimulant, carminative; in hiccups, &c. 3j ad 3j, in infusion 3j ad 3ij. See *Aqua*.

ANGELICA, (æ, f.) radix, caulis, folium, semen. Stimulant, stomachic, 3ss ad 3ijs. Root and stalk sialagogue.

ANGELICA SYLVESTRIS, radix. *E.* This differs from the former only in being much weaker.

ANGUSTURA, (æ, f.) cortex. *E.* Tonic, stomachic, gr. v ad 3j. Externally antiseptic.

ANISUM, (i, n.) semen. Anise. Stimulant, carminative, gr. xv ad 3ss, or more. See *Ol.* & *Spiritus*.

ANTIMONIUM CALCINATUM. (*Olim, Calx antim.*) Alterative, diaphoretic, gr. x ad 3ss, bis terve die.

ANTIMONIUM MURIATUM. (*Olim, Gauſt. antimoniæ.*)

ANTIMONIUM PRÆPARATUM. Alterative, diaphoretic, gr. xv ad 3ij, bis terve die.

ANTIMONIUM TARTARISATUM. (*Olim, Tart. emet.*) Emetic; gr. j ad gr. iv. Alterative, diaphoretic, gr. $\frac{1}{2}$ ad gr. $\frac{1}{2}$. Given in nauseating doses, it serves also as an useful

useful expectorant in pneumonic inflammations.
See *Vinum*.

ANTIMONIUM VITRIFACTUM. Emetic, gr. $\frac{1}{4}$ ad gr. iis. See *Vitrum*.

AQUA ALUMINIS COMPOSITA. L. (*Alum. zinci vitriol. sing. ʒſ; aq. diſt. ʒiv.*) Externally detergent, healing. Useful as a collyrium properly diluted, and as an injection in fluor albus when unaccompanied with virulence.

AQUA AMMONIAE. (*Olim, Spir. sal. amm.*) Stimulant, attenuant, antispasmodic, gr. xx to ʒj, or more. In gargles attenuant, detergent, ʒiſ ad ʒiiij in some suitable liquid ℥ſſ.

AQUA AMMONIAE ACETATÆ. (*Olim, Spir. Mind.*) Attenuant, diaphoretic, ʒij ad ʒvj. Also externally to inflamed milk breasts. Joined with an equal quantity of water, it forms an excellent collyrium for inflamed eyes, where there is a high degree of irritation and pain; and when further diluted with thrice its bulk of water, it serves likewise as an useful injection in the inflammatory stage of gonorrhœa.

AQUA AMMONIAE PURÆ. (*Olim, Spir. sal. amm. cum calce.*) Often used to stimulate the nostrils in fainting fits. The caustic volatile alkali has of late been found an efficacious styptic both to small and larger vessels, combined with a triple proportion of water. See *Linimentum*.

AQUA CALCIS. (*Calcis ℥ſſ; aq. diſt. ferventis ℥xij.*) Mix, and after standing an hour, in a covered vessel, decant off the clear.) Astringent, antacid; in fluor albus, diabetes, colliquative sweats, &c. ʒiv ad ℥j,

or more, partitis hauſtibus, daily, with or without a fifth of milk, which renders it much less disagreeable to the taste. Also externally to aphthæ, ulcers, &c. See *Linimentum*.

AQUA CUPRI AMMONIĀTI. (*Olim, Aq. sapphīrīna.*) Astringent, gt. v ad gt. xxx. Externally detergent. For specks and films of the cornea gt. ij or iij are ordered to be instilled into the eye; but a better method of applying it, is by means of a pencil brush.

AQUA CUPRI VITRIOLOĀTI COMPOSĪTA. E. (*Cupri vitriolati, aluminis, sing. ȝjs; aquæ, p. ȝiv; acidi vitriolici, p. ȝij.* Boil the salts in the water, until they are dissolved; then filter the liquor, and add the acid.) Externally to stop hæmorrhages at the nose, or other parts.

AQUA KALI PRÆPĀRĀTI. (*Olim, Lix. tartāri.*) L. Antacid, diuretic, gt. xv ad ȝj, or more, bis terve die. This contains about one part of alkaline salt to three of water.

AQUA KALI PURI. (*Olim, Lix. saponārium.*) Diuretic, lithontriptic, gt. x ad gt. l, bis die, enveloped in veal broth, or the like. Diluted with tepid water, in the proportion of gt. iij or iv to ȝij, and applied by means of an eye-tumbler for the space of a minute, or more, at a time, it serves likewise as an efficacious detergent in xerophthalmia. The ley obtained from the soapboilers is much stronger than this preparation.

AQUA LITHARGYRI ACETĀTI. (*Olim, Extr. Satūrni.*) L. Externally cooling, astringent, discutient, properly diluted. *Vide Cerat, & sequentem.*

AQUA LITHARGYRI ACETATI COMPOSITA. L. (Aq.
litharg. acet. p. 3j; aq. dist. libj; spir. vin. ten. 3j.) Externally sedative, astringent, &c. Made into a poultice with the crumbs of bread, it is sometimes applied in cases of local inflammation, and to improve the state of unhealthy sores.

AQUA ROSÆ. As a perfume; in lotions, collyria, &c.

AQUA ZINCI VITRIOLATI. E. (Zinci vitriolati gr. x; aquæ, p. 3v; acidi vitriolici diluti gt. x. Dissolve the vitriol in the water; then add the acid, and filtre through paper.) Externally cooling, astringent to inflamed or watery eyes.

AQUA ZINCI VITRIOLATI CUM CAMPHORA. L. (Zinci vitriol. 3js; aq. dist. 3iv; spir. camph. 3js.) Externally astringent; to scorbutic and phagedænic ulcers, and as a collyrium properly diluted.

AQUÆ DISTILLATÆ. AQUA ANETHI,—CINNAMOMI,—CORTICIS AURANTIORUM, E.—CORTICIS CASSIAE LIGNÆ, E.—CORTICIS LIMONUM, E.—FENICULI, L.—MENTHÆ PIPERITIDIS,—MENTHÆ SATIVÆ,—PIMENTO,—PULEGII. Of these severally 3j ad 3iiij, or more.

ARABICUM GUMMI. Demulcent, 3fs ad 3ijs; in decoctions ad libitum. See Emuls. & Mucilago.

ARGENTUM NITRATUM. (Olim, Caust. lunare.) Anti-epileptic, gr. $\frac{1}{20}$ gradually increased to gr. $\frac{1}{8}$, in a state of solution, ter die. Also externally to venereal and other ulcers, diluted in the proportion of gr. xv or 3j to water 3fs, when it is best applied by means

means of a bit of lint fixed at the end of a probe, or a pencil brush.

ARISTÖLÖCHÍA (æ, f.) TENUIS, *radix*. Slender birthwort. *E.* Stimulant, aromatic, tonic, emmenagogue; in chlorosis, retained menses, &c. ʒj ad ʒj, or more, bis terve die.

ARNICA, (æ, f.) *herba, flos, radix*. Leopard's-bane. Acrid, stimulant, diaphoretic; in paralytic and other disorders, in decoction or infusion ʒj ad ʒss, daily, in powder gr. v ad ʒj pro dosi. As this medicine is apt sometimes violently to affect the stomach, it is prudent to begin with small doses.

ARSENICUM, (i, n.) *E.* Tonic; in intermittents, periodic headachs, &c. The following is the solution recommended by Dr. Fowler. Take arsenic in powder, prepared kali, each gr. Ixiv, boil them gently in a Florence flask, or other glass vessel, with distilled water ℥ss, until the arsenic is dissolved; to this solution when cold, add comp. spir. of lavender ʒss, and as much water as will the whole equal to a pint, or ʒxvss in weight.

Dose to patients from 2 years old to 4, gt. ij or iij ad v,

from 5 ————— to 7, gt. v ad viij,

from 8 ————— to 12, gt. viij ad x,

from 13 ————— to 18, gt. x ad xij,

from 18 and upwards, gt. xij.

These doses he directs to be repeated once in 8 or 12 hours, diluted in thick gruel, or barley decoction. As arsenic, however, when given to the above extent, is apt to excite uneasiness in the stomach and bowels, it may be adviseable in general to employ it,

in doses perhaps a third less than those here recommended. Externally escharotic; against cancerous sores of the cheeks, nose, &c. in a state of solution, or in powder, once or twice a day, mixed in the proportion of one part to 30 or 40 of some other substance, such as the dried leaves of henbane, or the deadly nightshade.

ARTĒMISIA, (æ, f.) *folia*. Mugwort. E. Tonic, emmenagogue; in amenorrhœa, &c. 3j ad 3ij, in decoction or infusion 3j ad 3ij, bis terve die.

ARUM, (i, n.) *radix recens*. Wakerobin. Acrid, stimulant, attenuant, diuretic; in palsey, chronic rheumatism, &c. gr. vj ad 3j, or more, bis, ter, quaterve die, made into an emulsion with an equal weight of gum Arab. and half the quantity of spermaceti. Associated with alcalines or absorbents, it has been found also of singular service in some obstinate cases of cephalœa. See *Conserua*.

ASA FŒTIDA PURIFICATA, *gummi-resina*. Stimulant, antispasmodic, expectorant, emmenagogue, gr. x ad 3ij, bis terve die. See *Tinct*. In clyster laxative, 3j ad 3ij dissolved in gruel 3xij, in hysterical colics. Externally, see *Empl*.

ASARUM, (i, n.) *folium*. Asarabacca. Errhine, gr. ij ad gr. v, every night at bed time. See *Pulvis*.

ATTRIPLEX (icis, f.) *FŒTIDA*, *herba*. Stinking orach. E. Antispasmodic; in hysterical affections, &c. in infusion, tincture, or made into a conserve 3j ad 3ij, bis terve die. As this herb in drying loses much of its sensible qualities, it should, if possible, be used only in its fresh state.

AURANTIUM (ii, n.) HISPALENSE, folium, flos; fructus succus, et cortex exterior. Seville orange. Leaf and flower antispasmodic; in epilepsy &c. gr. x ad 3j, ter die. Outer rind of the fruit carminative, stomachic, 3fs ad 3ij, bis terve die. See Aq. Conf. Syr. & Tinct.

AVENA, (æ, f.) semen. Oat. In decoction nutritive, emollient. Dry oatmeal externally is useful to parts affected with erysipelatous inflammation.—Joined with a strong infusion of malt, and a spoonful of yeast, it constitutes the effervescent poultice so highly efficacious to mortified parts.—Formed into a poultice with vinegar and applied cold, it is employed also against sprains and bruises, and to stop the progress of scrophulous enlargements of the bones.

BALSAMUM CANADENSE. Stimulant, balsamic, diuretic, detergent, 3j ad 3ijs, bis terve die.

BALSAMUM COPAIVA. Stimulant, balsamic, diuretic, gr. xv ad 3fs, bis die. Laxative, diuretic; in cases of piles, &c. 3fs ad 3i, or more, semel aut bis die. Bals. of Copaiva 3ij, mucil. of gum Arab. 3fs, lime water 3iv, form a good astringent injection for gleets, and fluor albus.

BALSAMUM GILÉADENSE. E. Stimulant, balsamic, 3j ad 3j, bis terve die.

BALSAMUM PERUVIĀNUM. Stimulant, attenuant; in nervous complaints, palsies, gleets, asthmas, &c. gr. v ad 3fs, or more, bis terve die. See Tinct. Also externally to languid painful ulcers. United with a triple proportion of ox gall, Dr. Hugh Smith used

used to recommend it to be occasionally dropped into the ear, where a constant discharge of fetid matter indicated a diseased state of the secretions. This balsam is considerably warmer, and more acrid than bals. of Copaiwa.

BALSĀMUM TOLUTĀNUM. Stimulant, corroborant, expectorant; in coughs, gleets, seminal weaknesses, &c. gr. xv ad 3ij, bis terve die. See Syr. & Tincl.

BARDĀNA, (æ, f.) radix. Burdock. Aperient, diuretic, sudorific; against chronic aphthæ, gouty, rheumatic and other disorders, in decoction 3ij boiled in water libjss ad libj, daily.

BARÝTES, (ētis, f.) Ponderous earth. E. A watery solution of this earth saturated with muriatic acid, and known under the title of *Barytes muriata*, or *Terra ponderosa salita*, has of late been recommended in scrophula, indurations of the prostate gland, chronic pains in the stomach, &c. dose, gt. v ad gt. x, or more, bis terve die, in some distilled water.—This compound, says Dr. Crawford, combines the qualities of a tonic, diuretic, and deobstruent.

BECCABUNGA, (æ, f.) berba. Brooklime. L. Saponaceous, detergent, juice 3ij ad 3iv, daily.

BELLADONNA, (æ, f.) folia. Deadly nightshade. E. Narcotic, diaphoretic, diuretic, resolvent; in cancers, schirrus, mania, epilepsy, &c. in infusion gr. fs ad gr. v, or more, bis die. See Suc. From the uncertain operation of this medicine, it is prudent to begin with very small doses, and to increase them

them gradually according to their effects. Also externally against cancer, schirrus, &c.

BENZÖË, (es, f.) *rësïna*. Benjamin. See *Flor. & Tinet.*

BISTORTA, (æ, f.) *radix*. Snakeweed. Strongly astringent, gr. xv ad 3j, ter die.

BOLUS (i, m.) *GALLICUS*. French bole. *L.* Antacid, absorbent, 3j ad 3j.

BORAX, (äcis, f.) Deobstruent, diuretic, detergent, gr. x ad 3fs, bis terve die. In gargles detergent where viscid saliva abounds: also to aphthæ in the proportion of one part to 6, 8, or 10 of *Mel despumatum*, or *Mucilago sem. cydonii mali*.

BRYÖNIA, (æ, f.) *radix*. White bryony. *E.* Acrid, strongly cathartic; in dropsy, mania, &c. 3j ad 3j. Attenuant, diuretic, deobstruent; in dropsy, &c. gr. iij ad gr. x, bis terve die. An aqueous or vinous extract of this root acts both more mildly and with greater safety, taken in the quantity of from 3fs to 3j. In poultice fresh root discutient, resolvent; thus it is used against ischiadic and other rheumatic pains.

CAJEPUTA, (æ, f.) *oleum*. *E.* Cajeput. Stimulant, antispasmodic, sudorific; in tympanitic and various nervous affections, gt. iij ad gt. xij in wine, or on sugar, ter quaterve die. Also externally against palsy, pain and weakness from sprains, bruises, rheumatism, &c.

CALAMUS (i, m.) *AROMATICUS, radix*. Sweet-scented flag. Stimulant, aromatic, stomachic, gr. xv ad 3ij, or more, bis terve die.

CALOMËLAS, (änos, m.) Alterative, antivenereal, vermifuge,

vermifuge, deobstruent, gr. j ad gr. v, daily. Cathartic, gr. v ad gr. xij.

CALX, (cis, f.) Quicklime. See *Aqua*.

CALX HYDRARGYRI ALBA. (*Olim, Merc. præcip. alb.*) Externally detergent; against cutaneous foulnesses, pediculi, &c. See *Ung.* White calx of mercury, water of acetated litharge, each ʒj, yellow wax ʒij, ointment of hog's lard ℥vj, compose an efficacious application for foreness and inflammation of the eyelids, for old ulcers, tinea, and other cutaneous eruptions.—To the ointment of hog's lard and wax gently melted, add the white calx of mercury and water of acetated litharge previously rubbed together, then stir the mixture constantly till it is cold.

CALX CUM KALI PURO. (*Olim, Caust. com. fort.*)

CAMPHORA, (æ, f.) Camphor. Antiseptic, dia-phoretic, antispasmodic; in low malignant fevers, &c. gr. ijj ad ʒj repeatedly. In mania, gr. v ad ʒfs, bis terve die: in a recent case of this sort after having been gradually augmented to ʒj thrice a day, success shortly attended its exhibition. To make camphor properly diffusible in water, it should first be dissolved in a little spirit of wine, or expressed oil, and then well triturated with mucil. of gum Arab. See *Emuls.* & *Mift.* Externally anodyne. See *Ol.* Camphor ʒij dissolved in olive oil ʒj, to which is added water of pure ammonia ʒiiij, Mr. Cruikshank advises in cases of deep seated inflammation, or to quicken the action of parts that suppurate imperfectly.

CANCRIS CHĒLAE (ārum, pl. f.) PRÆPĀRĀTÆ. Antacid, absorbent, 3ſs ad 3j. Given to the extent of 3ſs a day, they are said to have been of use in leucorrhœa. See *Pulvis*.

CANELLĀ ALBA, cortex. Stimulant, aromatic, stomachic, gr. xv ad 3ij, bis terve die.

CANTHĀRIS, (īdis, f.) Spanish fly. Acrid, stimulant, diuretic; in suppression or incontinency of urine, arising from over-distension of the bladder, gr. j ad gr. iv, bis die. Also in certain cases of impotency, cantharis gr. ſs taken every night, has proved of use, joined with camphor and opium, each gr. j. See *Tinct*. Externally, see *Cerat. Empl. & Ung.*

CARDAMĪNE, (es, f.) *flos*. Lady's-smock, or cuckoo-flower. Stimulant, antispasmodic; against convulsive disorders, as epilepsy, hysteria, chorea, &c. 3ſs ad 3j, or more, bis terve die.

CARDAMŌMUM (i, n.) MINUS, *semen*. Lesser cardamom. Stimulant, carminative, stomachic, gr. v ad 3j. See *Tinct*.

CARDŪUS (i, m.) BENEDICTUS, *herba*. Blessed thistle. Tonic, stomachic, gr. xv ad 3j. A light infusion, as 3j macerated five or six hours in cold water 1bj, proves more grateful to weak stomachs and less heating, it is said, than any other bitter; and if drunk warm in bed, commonly increases perspiration. Strong decoctions or infusions are sometimes used to provoke vomiting, or to assist the operation of other emetics.

CARĪCA, (æ, f.) *fructus*. Fig. Demulcent; no. vj in any appropriate decoction 1bj.

CARŪON,

CARUON, (i, n.) *semen*. Caraway. Stimulant, carminative, stomachic, gr. x ad 3j. See *Aq. Ol. & Spir.*

CARYOPHILLUM (i, n.) AROMATICUM. Clove,—the unripe seed-vessel of the *caryophillus aromaticus*, clove-tree. Stimulant, aromatic, gr. v ad 3j. Also fialogogue. See *Oleum*.

CARYOPHILLUM RUBRUM, *flos*. Clove-gillyflower. Cordial, aromatic, 3j ad 3j. See *Syrupus*.

CASCARILLA, (æ, f.) *cortex*. Tonic, stomachic, aromatic; in flatulent colics, dysenteries, intermittents, &c. gr. x ad 3ij, bis, ter, quaterve die. See *Extr. & Tinct.*

CASSIA (æ, f.) FISTULARIS, *fructus*. Laxative, 3fs ad 3j. See *Electr.*

CASSIA LIGNEA, *cortex*, *flores nondum explicatae*. E. Stimulant, aromatic, gr. v ad 3j. This is somewhat weaker than cinnamon, which it strongly resembles; it has less astringency, but abounds with more mucilaginous matter. See *Aqua*.

CASTOREUM (i, n.) RUSSICUM, *in folliculo prope anum fito, collectum*. Russian castor. Antispasmodic, emmenagogue, gr. v ad 3j, or more. See *Tinct.*

CATAPLASMA (atis, n.) ALUMINIS. L. (With a lump of alum beat the white of two eggs until it is coagulated.) Cooling, restringent to inflamed eyes with much watery excretion. A solution of alum, says Dr. Cullen, in general answers much better.

CATAPLASMA CUMINI. L. (*Cumini lib;* *bac. lauri,* *fol. scordii, serpent. Virg. sing. 3iij;* *caryoph. aromat.* 3j; *mellis triplum omnium pondus.*) Warm, stimulating to parts disposed to gangrene from a languid circulation.

CĀTĀPLASMA SINAPĒOS. L. (*Sinapeos in pulv. triti, medullæ panis filiginei, sing. lbs; aceti callidi q. s.*) This often inflames and raises blisters. Applied to the soles of the feet, it is frequently of use in the low state of fevers, lethargic stupors, and in diverting gouty pains from the head, stomach, &c.

CATĒCHU, (n. indecl.) vulgo TERRA JAPONICA. Astringent; in diarrhoeas, uterine profluvia, &c. gr. xv ad 3ij. When suffered to dissolve leisurely in the mouth, it serves as an useful topical astringent for laxities and exulcerations of the gums, for aphthous ulcers in the mouth, and the like. See Elect. Infus. & Tinct.

CENTAURĒUM (i. n.) MINUS, cacumen. Lesser centaury. Tonic, aperient, stomachic, 3j ad 3j, ter die. In infusion 3js ad 3j to water ibi.

CĒRA ALBA, & FLAVA. Yellow wax sheathing; in diarrhoeas and dysenteries, 3j ad 3j, made into an emulsion with an equal proportion of gum Arab. in powder. Externally, see Empl. & Ung.

CERĀTUM CANTHARIDIS. (*Cerati sperm. ceti 3vj; canthar. pulv. 3j.*) This is stronger than the *ung. cantharidis*; it is useful in supporting a drain under the form of issue, and in cases of smallpox where the skin, to which a blister is to be applied, happens to be much affected.

CERĀTUM LAPIDIS CALAMINĀRIS. (*Lap. calam. ceræ flav. sing. lbs; ol. olivæ ibj.*) Desiccative, epulotic.

CERĀTUM LYTHARGYRI ACETĀTI COMPOSITUM. L. (Aq.

(*Aq. litharg. acet. ʒijss; ceræ flav. ʒiv; ol. olivæ ʒix; camphoræ ʒfs.*) Cooling, desiccative, resolvent; against chronic rheumatism, &c.

CERĀTUM RĒSĪNÆ FLAVÆ. (*Ung. resinæ flav. ℔fs; ceræ flavæ ʒj.*) Drawing.

CERĀTUM SAPŌNIS. *L.* (*Saponis ʒvijj; ceræ flav. ʒx; litharg. ℥bj; ol. olivæ ℥bj; aceti cong. j.*) Resolvent; against scrophulous tumours, &c. It is a convenient application in fractures, and may be used also as an external dressing for ulcers.

CERĀTUM SPERMĀTIS CĒTI. (*Sperm. ceti ʒfs; ceræ alb. ʒij; ol. olivæ ʒiv.*) Cooling, emollient; against excoriations, &c.

CERŪSSA, (æ, f.) Ceruse, or whitelead. Externally cooling, astringent; in unguents and lotions. See *Pulv.* & *Ung.*

CERŪSSA ACETĀTA. (*Olim, Sacch. Saturni.*) Astringent; in haemorrhages, colliquative diarrhoeas or sweats, &c. gr. fs ad gr. ij, with tinct. of opium gt. iv, 6tis horis. Externally weak solutions cooling, sedative, astringent; strong solutions stimulant, astringent. See *Unguentum*.

CHĀMÆMĒLUM, (i, n.) *flos simplex.* Chamomile. Tonic, stomachic, ʒj ad ʒj. Also in infusion. See *Extr.* Externally in fomentations discutient, anti-septic. See *Decoct.*

CICŪTA, (æ, f.) *herba, flos, semen.* Hemlock. Narcotic, alterative, resolvent. First give gr. iij of the dried leaves in powder, twice or thrice a day, & then increase the dose gradually according to its effects.

See *Suc.* Externally in fomentations discutient, resolvent,—fresh herb ʒiv ad ʒvj, or dried ʒij ad ʒijj boiled in water ℥biji to ℥bij. Also in poultice against cancers, &c. boiled with milk, and a like or double proportion of bread crumbs.

i CINĀRA, (æ, f.) *folium*. Artichoke. Tonic, diuretic; in dropsy, jaundice, &c. expressed juice ʒſ ad ʒj, bis die, mixed with an equal portion of white-wine.

CINCHŌNA, (æf.) *cortex*. (*Vulgo*, CORTEX PERUVIĀ-NUS.) Tonic, astringent, stomachic, gr. xv ad ʒj, or more. Should it excite vomiting, exhibit it in wine; if oppression at stomach, join with it an aromatic; if purging, opium. See *Decoꝝ. Extr.* & *Tinct.* For making a cold infusion with magnesia, Dr. Skeete recommends as follows:—Bark powder ʒſ, calcined magnesia ʒj, rub them together for fifteen minutes with a little water so as to form a paste, then add water ʒix gradually; infuse half an hour, shaking the vessel frequently, and filter thro' paper.

CINNAMŌMUM, (i. n.) *cortex*. The cinnamon-tree. Stimulant, astringent, aromatic, gr. v ad ʒj. See *Aq. Ol. Spir.* & *Tinct.*

COCCÍNELLA, (æ, f.) Cochineal. Employed only as a colouring drug.

COCHLEĀRIA (æ, f.) HORTENSIS, *herba*. Garden-scurvygrass. Stimulant, attenuant, aperient, expressed juice ad ʒiv, bis die. See *Succus*.

COLCHICUM, (i, n.) *radix recens*. Meadow-saffron. Acrid, diuretic, cathartic, gr. ſs ad gr. iij, bis die.

As,

As, however, even small doses in substance have produced alarming effects, it is now commonly given in the form of oxymel or syrup; which see.

CÖLÖCYNTHIS, (*idis, f.*) *fructus medulla*. Bitter apple. Strongly cathartic, gr. iij ad gr. viij, triturated with some gummy farinaceous matter. See *Extr.*

COLOMBA, (*æ, f.*) *radix*. Tonic, stomachic; in bilious vomitings and diarrhoeas, &c. gr. x ad 3ss, in infusion 3j ad 3j. See *Tinct.*

CONFECTIO AROMATICA. (*Zedoarie, croci, sing. libss; pulv. cibolar. cancri comp. 3xvj; cinnam. myristicæ, sing. 3ij; caryoph. arom. 3j; cardam. 3fj; sacch. purif. libj.*) Stimulant, antispasmodic, astringent, gr. xv ad 3j.

CONFECTIO OPIATA. L. (*Opii 3vij; piperis longi, zingib. carui, sing. 3ij; syr. papav. albi, ad mellis crassitudinem decocti, triplum omnium pondus.*) Stimulant, carminative, anodyne, gr. x ad 3is. Thirty-six gr. contain one of opium.

CONSERVA ABSINTHI MARITIMI. L. (*Absinth. marit. 3iv; sacch. purif. libj.*) Tonic, stomachic, 3ij ad 3ss, bis terve die. Cons. of sea-wormwood 3j, rust of iron 3ss, cons. of arum 3ij, syr. of orange-peel q. s.—dose, the size of a nutmeg, night and morn, against hypochondriasis, epilepsy, worms, amenorrhœa, &c.

CONSERVA ARI. L. (*Ari recent. libss; sacch. purif. libss.*) Stimulant, attenuant, diuretic, 3ss ad 3iss, bis, ter, quaterve die.

CONSERVA AURANTII HISPALENSIS CORTICIS EXTERIORIS. (*Cort. aurant. 3iv; sacch. pur. libj.*) Tonic, stomachic, 3ij ad 3v, bis terve die.

CONSERVA CYNOSBĀTI. (*Cynosb.* libj; *sacch.* pur. 3xx.) Cooling, restringent, 3ij ad 3vj.

CONSERVA LUJÜLÆ. L. (*Lujulae* 3iv; *sacch.* pur. libj.) Subacid, cooling, restringent, 3ij ad 3fs.

CONSERVA MENTHÆ. E. (*Menthæ sativæ* fol. recent. 3j; *sacchari purif.* 3iij.) Stimulant, stomachic; in sickness and weakness of the stomach, &c. 3j ad 3iij.

CONSERVA PRŪNI SYLVESTRIS. (*Pulpæ prunorum* 3iv; *sacch.* pur. libj.) Astringent; in diarrhoeas, &c. 3ij ad 3fs.

CONSERVA ROSÆ RUBRÆ. (*Rosar.* rubr. 3iv; *sacch.* purif. libj.) Subastringent, 3ij ad 3fs.

CONSERVA SCILLÆ. L. (*Scillæ rec.* 3j; *sacch.* pur. 3v.) Expectorant, diuretic, 3fs ad 3j, bis terve die.

CONTRAYĒRVA, (æ, f.) radix. Stimulant, anti-septic, diaphoretic, gr. x ad 3fs, in infusion or decoction 3fs ad 3j, or more. See *Pulv.* Also detergent in gargles for the putrid sore throat,—3fs boiled a short time in compound barley decoction 3xij, to which, when strained, are added vinegar 3ij, tinct. of myrrh 3j, honey 3vj.

CONVALLARIA, (æ, f.) radix. Solomon's seal. E. Mucilaginous, demulcent. This is commonly used in the form of poultice, as a discutient in inflammations, contusions, &c.

CORALLIUM (ii, n.) RUBRUM PRÆPÄRÄTUM. L. Absorbent, antacid, gr. x ad 3j.

CÖRIANDRUM, (i, n.) semen. Coriander. Stimulant, carminative, 3j ad 3j.

CORNU CERVI. Hartshorn. Boiled in water, this gives out an emollient nutritious jelly. An elegant jelly is prepared by boiling 3vj of shavings in water libj to libj, adding to the strained liquor of Seville orange or lemon juice 3j, whitewine 3iv, sugar 3vj; and then boiling the whole to a due consistence.

CORNU CERVI USTUM. Absorbent, antacid, astrin-
gent, 3ss ad 3iss. See Decoc^t.

CRĒTA PRÆPĀRĀTA. Prepared chalk. Absorbent,
antacid, 3j ad 3j. In diarrhoeas and dysenteries even
3jj have been given for a dose. See Mijl. & Pulv.

CROCUS, (i, m.) *floris stigma*. Saffron. Cordial,
diaphoretic, gr. v ad 3ss. See Syr. & Tinet.

CROCUS ANTIMONII. (*Olim, Crocus metallorum.*)
Violently emetic, gr. j ad gr. iv.

CUBĒBA, (æ, f.) The cubeb. Stimulant, aro-
matic, gr. v ad 3j. This is far inferior to pepper
in aromatic warmth, but its odour is thought more
agreeable.

CÜCÜMIS (is, m.) AGRESTIS, *fructus recens*. Wild
cucumber. See Elaterium; which is wholly prepared
from it.

CUMÍNUM, (i, n.) *semen*. Cummin. Stimulant,
antispasmodic, 3j ad 3j. Externally, see Catapl. &
Emplastrum.

CUPRUM AMMÔNIACUM. E. (*Cupri vitriolati puriss.*
partes duas; ammoniae pptæ partes tres. Rub them
together in a glass mortar until they unite into an
uniform violet-coloured mass, which must first be

dried on blotting paper, and afterwards by a gentle heat. The product should be kept in a well closed phial.) Astringent, anti-epileptic, gr. $\frac{1}{2}$ ad gr. v, bis terve die. Half a grain for a dose is enough to begin with. See *Pilula*.

CUPRUM VITRIOLATUM. (*Olim, Vitriol. cærul.*) Speedily emetic, gr. ij ad gr. x, dissolved in a cupful of water, lbs of warm water being previously swallowed. Corroborant; in epilepsy, hysteria, &c. gr. $\frac{1}{2}$ ad gr. $\frac{1}{2}$, or more, bis terve die. Joined with olibanum & extract of bark, it is used also for gleets, and in the latter stage of gonorrhœa. Externally styptic, (see *Aqua*) echarotic; to destroy fungous flesh, &c. Vitriolated copper, French bole, each 3js, camphor 3j, boiling water l̄biv, form the *Aqua camphorata* of Bates; which when diluted with sixteen times its quantity of cold water is recommended by Mr. Ware for the purulent ophthalmia of new-born children.

CURCUMA, (x, f.) *radix*. Turmeric. Tonic, aperient, deobstruent, 3j ad 5j, in decoction 5jj ad 3ij.

CURSUTA, (æ, f.) *radix*. Yellow gentian. E. Tonic, stomachic; in dyspepsy, dysphagia, &c. gr. x ad 3ij, in infusion 3j ad 3j, ter die.

CYDONIUM MÄLUM, (i, n.) *ejusque semen*. Quince,—the fruit of the *cydonia malus*, quince-tree. Subacid, astringent; seed mucilaginous. See *Mucil.*

CYNOSBÄTUS, (i, f.) *fructus*. Wild briar, or hip-tree. Cooling, restringent. See *Conf.*

DAUCUS (i. m.) SYLVESTRIS, *femen.* Wild carrot. Stomachic, diuretic, 3j ad 3j. In infusion 3j to water lbj.

DECOCTUM ALTHÆÆ. E. (*Rad. althææ fccataæ 3ij; uvarum passarum, demptis acinis, 3ij; aquæ, p. libvij.* Boil to five pounds; place apart the strained liquor till the feces have subsided, then pour off the clear.) Demulcent; in nephritic paroxysms, &c. ad libitum.

DECOCTUM CHAMÆMELI. E. (*Flor. chamæmeli 3j; sem. carui 3ss; aquæ, p. libv.* Boil fifteen minutes, and strain.) This simple preparation may be employed either in the way of clyster, or fomentation.

DECOCTUM CINCHONÆ, SIVE CORTICIS PERUVIANI. (*Cinch. pulv. 3j; aquæ dist. libj 3ij.* Boil ten minutes, in a covered vessel, and strain whilst hot.) Tonic, astringent, 3j ad 3iv.

DECOCTUM CORNU CERVI. L. (*Cornu cervi usci 3ij; Arab. gum. 3vj; aq. dist. libij.* Boil to libj, stirring constantly, and strain.) Absorbent, antacid; in fevers attended with laxity of the bowels, &c. 3ij ad 3iv.

DECOCTUM PRO ENEMATE. L. (*Malvaæ fccataæ 3j; chamæm. 3ss; aquæ libj.* Boil a little, and strain.) Emollient.

DECOCTUM PRO FOMENTO. L. (*Abrotoni, absinth. marit. chamæm. sing. 3j; fol. lauri 3ss; aquæ libvj.* Boil a little, and strain.) Discutient, antiseptic.

DECOCTUM GEOFFRAEÆ. E. (*Cort. Geoffrææ in pulv. triti 3j; aquæ, p. libj.* Boil gently to one half, and strain.) Laxative, narcotic, anthelmintic, 3j ad 3ij, or

or more, semel aut bis die. First direct small doses, and give strict caution against drinking water that is cold. In case any violent effects, such as sickness, fever and delirium, should be induced by it, castor oil, warm water, and vegetable acids are to be freely employed.

DECOCTUM GUAJACI COMPOSITUM. *E.* (*Scobis ligni guaiaci 3ij; uvarum passarum, 3ij; rad. saffras, glycyrrhizæ, sing. 3j; aquæ, p. libx.* Boil the water with the guaiacum and raisins to one half, adding towards the end the saffraſ and liquorice; then strain without expression.) Stimulant, diaphoretic; in cutaneous diseases, &c. 3iv ad 3vj, bis terve die.

DECOCTUM HELLÉBÖRI ALBI. *L.* (*Pulv. helleb. alb. 3j; aquæ libij; spir. vin. rect. p. 3ij.* Boil the water with the hellebore to libj, and to the strained liquor, when cold, add the spirit.) For cutaneous foulnesses, as psora, tinea, &c. In some instances this requires dilution.

DECOCTUM HORDÆI. (*Hordei, omni cortice nudati, 3ij; aquæ libiv.* First wash the barley from any adhering impurities, and then boil it a little with water libis; this water being thrown away, add to the barley the libiv of water hot, and boil to libij.) Nutritive, emollient, 3ij ad 3vj, ad libitum.

DECOCTUM HORDÆI COMPOSITUM. *L.* (*Decoct. bord. libij; uvarum passarum, acinis exemplis, caricarum, sing. 3ij; glycyrb. 3ss; aquæ libj.* Boil to libij.) Pectoral, demulcent, 3ij ad 3vj, or ad libitum.

DECOCTUM MEZERÆI. *E.* (*Corticis radicis mezerei 3ij;*

zij; rad. glycyrrhizæ cont. 3ss; aquæ, p. libij. Boil to two pounds, and strain.) Acrid, stimulant, alterative; in glandular swellings, &c. *3iv ad libis, ter quaterve die.*

DECOCTUM SARSAPARILLÆ. (*Sarsapar. concifæ 3vj; aquæ libvij.* Macerate the sarsaparilla two hours in a heat of about 195° , then take it out and bruise it, and again macerate it in the liquor for two hours; then boil to libv, and strain the expressed liquor.) Alterative, diaphoretic, *3iv ad libss, bis terve die.* In syphilitic complaints, after the ineffectual use of mercury, libij have been given in divided doses daily, with advantage. Taken with an equal proportion of milk, it has been experienced also of excellent use in restoring strength to persons greatly debilitated from a long continued and free course of mercury.

DECOCTUM SARSAPARILLÆ COMPOSITUM. L. (*Sarsapar. concifæ et cont. 3vij; sassafras, guaiaci rasi, glycyrrh. cont. sing. 3j; mezerei 3ij; aquæ libx.* Macerate with a gentle heat, six hours, then boil to libv, adding towards the end the mezereon, and strain.) Alterative, sudorific; in venereal nodes, ulcers, &c. *3iv ad libss, bis, ter, quaterve die.* This may be considered as an elegant improvement of what has been long sold under the title of the *Lisbon Diet Drink*; which is said to be a decoction of *3ij* of sarsaparilla, *3ss* of mezereon, and *3ij* of crude antimony, with liquorice, &c. boiled in water *libx* to *libv*.

DECOCTUM SENĒKÆ. E. (*Rad. senekæ 3j; aquæ, p. libij.* Boil to *3xvj* by weight, and strain.) Acrid, diuretic,

diuretic, cathartic; in hydroptic, rheumatic and arthritic complaints, &c. $\frac{3}{4}$ ss ad $\frac{3}{4}$ jj, ter quaterve die. To obviate the uneasy sensation which seneka is apt to excite in the fauces, $\frac{3}{4}$ jj of liquorice root may be advantageously added in the boiling.

DECOCIMUM ULMI. L. (*Ulmi cont.* $\frac{3}{4}$ iv; *aqua fibi* v. Boil to $\frac{1}{2}$ jj.) Emollient, subastringent; in chronic eruptions, &c. $\frac{3}{4}$ iv ad $\frac{1}{2}$ ss, bis die. A much stronger preparation than this has been given by some.

DICTAMNUS (i, m.) ALEUS, *radix*. White fraxinella, or bastard dittany. E. Tonic, stomachic; in intermittents, worms, menstrual suppressions, epilepsy, &c. $\frac{3}{4}$ j ad $\frac{3}{4}$ ss, bis die.

DIGITALIS, (is, f.) *herba*. Foxglove. Acrid, diuretic, often emetic, sometimes cathartic, in powder gr. j ad gr. iij, bis die, with some aromatic, or $\frac{3}{4}$ ss ad $\frac{3}{4}$ j of an infusion made by macerating four hours, $\frac{3}{4}$ j of the dried leaves in boiling water $\frac{1}{2}$ ss, adding at the end $\frac{3}{4}$ j of some spirituous water. As soon as the kidneys, stomach, pulse, or bowels are perceived to be affected, its use should be suspended. In dropsy a grain or two of calomel, once or twice a day, has been successfully conjoined. With respect to its use in dropsy, Dr. Withering observes that it seldom succeeds in men of great natural strength, of tense fibre, of warm skin, of florid complexion, or in such as have a tight & cordy pulse, or when the belly in ascites is tense, hard, and circumscribed, or the limbs in anaesthesia solid and resisting: on the contrary, if the pulse be feeble or intermitting, the countenance pale, the lips livid, the skin cold, the

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swollen belly soft and fluctuating, the anaërobous limbs readily pitting, then we may expect diuretic effects from it.

DÖLICHOS, (i, m.) *pubes leguminis rigida*. Cow-hage. E. Anthelmintic; gr. v. ad gr. x, or more, in syrup or molasses, bis terve die; a purgative being interposed once in two or three days.

DULCÄMÄRA, (æ, f.) *slipites*. Woody nightshade. E. Narcotic, diaphoretic, diuretic, resolvent; in obstructed menses, scrophula, lepra and other cutaneous diseases, in cancer, rheumatism, &c. fresh stalks ʒij, water ℥iv, boil to ℥ij; or dried stalks ʒſs ad ʒj, boiling water ʒxx, macerate half an hour, then boil ten minutes,—dose, ʒſs ad ʒiv, with a little milk, bis, ter, quaterve die. This plant, more especially when fresh, being endowed with a narcotic power, should at first be used only in small doses.

ELATERIUM, (ii, n.) Strongly cathartic, sometimes emetic; in cold indolent phlegmatic habits gr. ſs ad gr. iiij. Dropfy, we are told, has been sometimes cured by giving extr. of gentian gr. iv, elaterium gr. 1, once in two hours, until a sufficient operation ensued by stool, and repeating this process every third or fourth day.

ELECTUÄRIUM CASSIÆ. (*Pulpa cassis* ʒvj; *manna* ʒij; *pulpa tamarind.* ʒj; *syr. roseæ* ʒvj. Evaporate to an electuary.) Laxative, ʒij ad ʒi.

ELECTUÄRIUM CATÉCHU. E. (*Catechu* ʒiv; *kino* ʒij; *cort. cinnamomi*, *nuclei fructus myristicæ*, *sing.* ʒj; *opii*, *in vini albi Hispani quantum sufficiat diffusi*, ʒſs; *syr.*

syr. rosæ, ad mellis spissitudinem cocti, p. libij 3ij.)
Astringent; in diarrhoeas, &c. 3j ad 3j. Ten scr. contain gr. j of opium.

ELECTUARIUM OPIATUM. E. (*Cort. cinnamomi, cardamomi min. rad. zingib. sing. in pulv. trit. 3ij; rad. serpent. Virgin. in pulv. trite 3ij; opii in vini albi quantum satis sit diffusi, 3ss; mellis despumati, p. libj.)* Stimulant, aromatic, 3j ad 3ij, or more. One dr. contains about gr. j of opium.

ELECTUARIUM SCAMMONII. L. (*Scam. 3ss; caryoph. arom. zingib. sing. 3vj; ol. carui effent. P. 3ss; syr. rose q. s.*) Cathartic, 3ss ad 3j.

ELECTUARIUM SENNAE. (*Senna 3vij; caricarum libj; pulpæ tamarind,—cassiae,—prunor. Gallic. sing. libss; coriand. 3iv; glycyrrh. 3ij; faceb. pur. libjss.*) Laxative, 3j ad 3ss.

ELÉMI, (n. indecl.) *rēsīna*. Stimulant, balsamic, gr. x ad 3ss. Used chiefly in unguents. See *Ung.*

EMPLASTRUM AMMÖ NIÄCI CUM HYDRARGYRO. L. (*Amm. colati libj; hydrarg. p. 3ij; ol. sulphurati, p. 3j.*) Resolvent; to nodes, topes, indurated glands and tumours. Five oz. contain about one of quicksilver.

EMPLASTRUM ASÆ FETIDÆ. E. (*Empl. lithargyri, asæ fætidæ colatæ, sing. partes duas; ceræ flavæ, galbani colati, sing. partem unam.*) Anodyne, antispasmodic. In hysterical cases, this is sometimes applied to the umbilical region, or over the whole abdomen.

EMPLASTRUM CANTHARIDIS. (*Canthar. libj; empl. ceræ libj; adip. suillæ pptæ libss.*) For raising blisters.

EMPLASTRUM CĒRÆ COMPOSITUM. (*Ceræ flavæ, sevi ovilli, sing. lbij; resinæ flavæ. lbj.*) Drawing;—sometimes employed for the dressing of blisters.

EMPLASTRUM CUMINI. L. (*Sem. cumini,—carui, bac. lauri, sing. 3ij; picis Burgund. lbij; ceræ flavæ 3ij.*) Applied to the hypogastric region or stomach, this is used as a warm discutient, and to expel flatulence.

EMPLASTRUM LADĀNI COMPOSITUM. L. (*Ladani 3ij; thuris 3j; cinnamomi 3ss; ol. myristicæ expressi, p. 3ss; ol. menthae effent. p. 3j.*) Warm, strengthening; in weaknesses of the stomach, vomitings, &c. It is sometimes employed also to promote the suppuration of inactive tumours.

EMPLASTRUM LITHARGYRI. (*Litharg. 3xv; ol. olivæ lbij; aquæ lbs.*) Defensive; for excoriations of the skin, &c.

EMPLASTRUM LITHARGYRI COMPOSITUM. (*Empl. litharg. lbij; galbani 3vij; terebinth. vulg. 3x; thuris 3ij.*) Warm, stimulating, suppurative. Comp. plaster of litharge 3j, plaster of cantharides 3ij, form the *Emplastrum calidum* of late frequent use in fixed pains, as in rheumatism, sciatica, &c.

EMPLASTRUM LITHARYRI CUM HYDRARGYRO. (*Empl. litharg. lbj; hydrarg. p. 3ij; ol. sulphurati, p. 3j.*) Resolvent. Five oz. contain about one of quicksilver.

EMPLASTRUM LYTHARGYRI CUM RĒSINA. (*Empl. litharg. lbij; resinæ flavæ. lbs.*) Adhesive;—used as a retentive to the divided edges of a wound, or to confine other dressings.

EMPLASTRUM

EMPLASTRUM PICIS BURGUNDICÆ COMPOSITUM.
L. (*Picis Burgund. libij; ladani libj; resinae flav. ceræ
flav. sanguin. 3ij; ol. myristicæ expressi, P. 3j.*) Stimulant,
rubefacient. Applied to the temples or fore-head,
this is sometimes of use in pains of the head.

EMPLASTRUM SAPONIS. (*Saponis lib/s; empl. li-
tharg. libij.*) Discutient, applied to lymphatic or
other tumours.

EMPLASTRUM THURIS COMPOSITUM. (*Thuris lib/s;
fang. draconis 3ij; empl. litharg. libij.*) Adhesive,
strengthening.

EMULSIO ARABICA. E. (This is made by adding
3ij of mucil. of gum Arab. to libj of almond-milk,
while beating the almonds.) Cooling, demulcent,
ad libitum.

EMULSIO CAMPHORATA. E. (*Camphoræ 3j; amygdalas dulces decorticatus x; sacch. purif. 3j; aquæ, P.
3vj.* Grind the camphor and almonds well together in a stone mortar, and add by degrees the water;
then strain the liquor, and dissolve in it the sugar.) Dose, 3fs ad 3ij. For its virtues, see *Camphora*.

ENULA CAMPANA, radix. Elecampane. Aromatic,
expectorant, diuretic, 3j ad 3j, or more, bis ter
die.

ERYNGIUM, (ii, n.) radix. Eryngo, or seaholly.
L. Aperient, diuretic, 3ij ad 3ij. To make mock
 afs's milk, take eryngo, pearl barley, each 3is, li-
quorice root 3ij, water libj; boil to libj; then strain,
and add an equal portion of fresh cow's milk.

EXTRACTUM CACUMINIS GENISTÆ. *L.* Laxative, diuretic, 3*ss* ad 3*j*, or more, bis terve die.

EXTRACTUM CASCARILLÆ. *L.* Tonic, stomachic; in dyspepsy, debility of the bowels, &c. gr. x ad 3*ss*, bis terve die.

EXTRACTUM CHAMÆMELI. Tonic, stomachic, gr. x ad 3*j*, bis terve die.

EXTRACTUM CINCHONÆ, SIVE CORTICIS PERUVIANI. *L.* Ten or twelve grains of the hard extract are reckoned equivalent to about 3*ss* of the bark itself; but this preparation, though moderately strong in point of bitterness, possesses only a small degree of astringency.

EXTRACTUM CINCHONÆ, SIVE CORTICIS PERUVIANI, CUM RESINA. This preparation is different from the former, having the two qualities of bitterness and astringency proportionably united. It is esteemed equivalent to about six times its quantity of the bark in substance.

EXTRACTUM COLOCYNTHIDIS COMPOSITUM. (*Colocynth. 3vj; aloes sicc. 3ijs; scammonii 3ss; sem. cardam. 3j.*) Cathartic, gr. v ad 3*ss*.

EXTRACTUM GENTIANÆ. Tonic, stomachic, gr. x ad 3*ij*, bis terve die.

EXTRACTUM GLYCRRHIZÆ. Demulcent, 3*j* ad 3*iiij*, ad libitum.

EXTRACTUM HÆMATOXÝLI, SIVE LIGNI CAMPECHIANI. Astringent; in diarrhoeas, &c. 3*j* ad 3*ij*.

EXTRACTUM HELLEBÓRI NIGRI. Alterative, attenuant,

tenuant, diuretic, emmenagogue, gr. iij ad gr. viij, bis terve die. Cathartic, diuretic, resolvent, gr. x ad 3j. Extract of black hellebore, myrrh, each 3j, blessed thistle 3ij, form the basis of Bacher's famous tonic pill; of which in dropsies he used to give, in three divided portions, at the distance of an hour each, from 3ss to 3ij, or more, daily, varying the dose according to the strength of its action, and the constitution. In taking this pill drinking plentifully is to be enjoined.

EXTRACTUM JALAPII. Cathartic, gr. viij ad gr. xv, well triturated with some testaceous powder.

EXTRACTUM PAPAVERIS ALBI. Anodyne, narcotic, gr. j ad gr. v. This, it is said, has about half the strength of opium; and when united with simple syrup in the proportion of gr. ij to 3j, may be substituted occasionally for the *Syrupus papa-veris albi*.

EXTRACTUM PULSATILLÆ NIGRICANTIS. E. Acrid, stimulant, resolvent; in cataracts and amaurosis, in venereal nodes, nocturnal pains, indurated glands, serpiginous eruptions, melancholy, palsy, &c. gr. iij ad 3j, or more, bis terve die.

EXTRACTUM RUTÆ. Stimulant, attenuant, tonic, detergent, gr. x ad 3j, or more, bis terve die.

EXTRACTUM SABINÆ. L. Stimulant, aperient, emmenagogue, gr. x ad 3ss, bis terve die.

EXTRACTUM SENNÆ. L. Cathartic, gr. x ad 3ss.

FERRI LIMATURA PURIFICATA. E. Tonic, astrin-

gent,

gent, deobstruent; in chlorosis where acidity in the first passages abounds, &c. gr. iij ad 3j, bis terve die.

FERRI RUBIGO, (*īnis, f.*) Astringent, aperient, gr. x ad 3fs. Emmenagogue, gr. xv ad 3j, or more, joined with some aromatic, ter quaterve die.

FERRUM AMMONIACALE. (*Olim, Flor. Martiales.*) Astringent, attenuant, deobstruent, gr. iij ad gr. xv, or more, bis terve die, in the form of bolus, or pills prepared with some gum-resin. This or some other strong preparation of iron, (as the *Tinct. ferri muriati,*) Mr. Cline is wont to recommend in scirrhouſe affections of the breasts. See *Tinct.*

FERRUM TARTARISATUM. L. Astringent, deobſtruent, gr. iij ad gr. xv, bis terve die.

FERRUM VITRIOLATUM. (*Olim, Sal Martis.*) Astringent, aperient, emmenagogue, gr. fs ad gr. v, bis terve die. In clysters, vermifuge, gr. v ad 3j.

FILIX, (*īcis, f.*) *radix.* Male fern. Astringent, aperient, anthelmintic; in cases of tænia, to an adult 3ij ad 3iiij, to a child 3j, early in the morning, with a mercurial cathartic two hours after; which process, if necessary, is to be repeated at due intervals. Respecting the anthelmintic virtue of this root, Dr. Cullen expresses considerable doubt.

FLAMMULA JOVIS, *folia, flores.* Upright virgin's-bower. E. Acrid, stimulant, diuretic, diaphoretic; in syphilitic cases with pains in the bones, nodes, or ulcers, in cutaneous diseases, &c. 3fs ad 3ij, or more, infused in boiling water 3iv, ter die.

FLORES BENZÖEſ. Stimulant, expectorant, deobſtruent;

struent; in dyspnoeas, &c. gr. x ad ʒſs. See *Tinct.*
Also errhine.

FLORES SULPHŪRIS LOTI. Laxative, diaphoretic,
ʒj ad ʒj. See *Troch.*

FOENICULUM DULCE, *semen*. Sweet fennel. Stimulant, diuretic, carminative, ʒj ad ʒj. See *Aqua*.

FOĒNUM GRÆCUM, *semen*. Fenugreek. Emollient; in cataplasms, and clysters. One oz. boiled in water lbij, renders it thick and slimy.

FULIGO (gīnis, f.) LIGNI. Woodfoot. E. Corroborant, antispasmodic; in hysterical cases, gr. x ad ʒj, in tincture or infusion ʒjj, or more.

FUMĀRIA, (æ, f.) *herba*. Fumitory. E. Tonic, attenuant, deobstruent; in melancholic and cutaneous diseases of the leprous kind, &c. juice ʒſs ad ʒii, bis die. Also in decoction.

GALBĀNUM PURIFICĀTUM, *gummi-rēsīna*. Antispasmodic; against nervous and hysterical disorders, gr. x ad ʒi, or more. See *Pil.* & *Tinct.*

GALLA, (æ, f.) The gall. Powerfully astringent, gr. x ad ʒſs. Also externally against the piles, mixed with six or eight times its quantity of lard, and a little camphor; or, by way of fomentation—bruised galls ʒſs, boiling water lbij, macerate an hour, and strain.

GAMBOGIA, (æ, f.) *gummi-rēsīna*. Gamboge. Cathartic, hydragogue; in dropsy, &c. gr. iij ad gr. iv, in fine powder, every three hours, till it operates. Emetic, cathartic; in tænia, &c. gr. vj ad gr. x, or more, joined with an equal proportion of prepared kali.

kali. Gamboge gr. xxxvj, spir. of ammonia ʒiv,—of this a tea spoonful or two, taken night and morn, has been of service in some cutaneous diseases.

GĒNĪSTA, (æ, f.) *cacūmen, semen.* Broom. Cathartic, diuretic, ʒj ad ʒj. See *Extr.* The cure of dropsy, says Dr. Cullen, has been sometimes effected by giving ʒj of a decoction, made by boiling ʒfs of fresh broom tops in water ʃbj to ʃfs, every hour or two, till it operated by stool and urine, and repeating this process every, or every other day, accordingly.

GENTIĀNA, (æ, f.) *radix.* Gentian. Tonic, stomachic, gr. x ad ʒij. See *Extr. Infus. Tinā. & Vinum.*

GEOFFRĒA, (æ, f.) *cortex.* Cabbage-tree. E. Laxative, detergent, narcotic, anthelmintic; against the lumbrici, ascarides, &c. ʒj ad ʒij. But this is best given in the form of decoction or syrup, the former of which see.

GINSENG, (n, indecl.) *radix.* Stimulant, aromatic, ʒj ad ʒj.

GLYCYRRHĪZA, (æ, f.) *radix.* Liquorice. Attenuant, demulcent, ʒfs ad ʒj. See *Extr. & Troch.* This, it has been said, possesses the property of allaying the sensation of thirst.

GRANĀTUM, (i, n.) *floris petālum, fructus cortex.* The pomegranate-tree. Flowers, called Palaustine, mildly astringent, ʒfs ad ʒfs. Bark of the fruit powerfully astringent, ʒj ad ʒj, in infusion or decoction ʒij ad ʒfs.

GRATIÖLA, (æ. f.) *herba*. Hedge-hyssop. Emetic, purgative, diuretic, anthelmintic; in dropsy, worms, &c. gr. x ad 3j, or more, in infusion 3ij of the fresh herb, or 3j of the dried. A slight decoction in milk, it is said, operates the mildest. This being an active medicine, it may be prudent perhaps to use it only in small doses, and to repeat these, at short intervals, after the manner of Bergius; who in certain cases directs gr. x in powder, with half as much gentian, every two hours, till it operates.

GUĀIĀCUM, (i, n.) *lignum, cortex, gummi-rēsīna*. Stimulant, diaphoretic. The wood and bark in decoction; which see. Gum, gr. v. ad 3j, in the form of bolus, or milk prepared by first triturating the gum with an equal proportion of fine sugar, and then with mucilage of gum Arab. or yolk of egg, so as to be miscible with water or watery liquors. When exhibited in this last form, says Dr. Cullen, in a quantity sufficient over night, (as from gr. xv to 3ss,) to open the belly once next day, we have found it useful in chronic rheumatism, or even when disorders of the stomach, or wandering pains in other parts of the body could be imputed to atonic or retrocedent gout.

HÆMATOXÝLUM, (i, n.) *lignum*. Logwood. Astringent, 3j ad 3j. See *Extractum*.

HËDËRA TERRESTRIS, *herba*. Groundivy. E. Stimulant, tonic, expectorant, aperient, 3fs ad 3j, in infusion 3j ad 3iij, bis terve die.

HELLËBÖRÄSTER, (stri, m.) *felium*. Bear's-foot. Emetic, cathartic, vermifuge; against the lumbrici, &c.

&c. in decoction 3ij of the fresh leaves, or 3ij of the dried, semel aut bis die.

HELLÉBÖRUS (i, m.) ALBUS, *radix*. White hellebore. Sternutatory. See *Decoct. Tinct. & Ung.*

HELLÉBÖRUS NIGER, *radix*. Black hellebore. Alterative, attenuant, and in plethoric habits emmenagogue, gr. ij ad gr. vj, bis terve die. Strongly cathartic; in mania, &c. gr. x ad 3j, or more. See *Extr. & Tinct.*

HIPPOCÄSTÄNUM, (i, n.) *fructus*. The horse-chestnut. E. Errhine; against ophthalmia, headaches, &c. in powder gr. iij or iv, every evening; also in decoction or infusion. The bark likewise of this tree has been successfully employed for the cure of intermittents, in doses similar to those of cinchona.

HORDËUM, (i, n.) *semen*, *semen omni cortice nudatum*. Barley. See *Decoct.*

HYDRARGYRUS (i, m.) ACETÄTUS. Alterative, antivenereal, gr. j ad gr. vj, or more, semel aut bis die. This, which forms the basis of Keyser's pill, says Mr. Bell, is milder in its operation and less disposed to affect the stomach and bowels than any other preparation of mercury internally employed; but at the same time he considers it as less certain in curing venereal disorders.

HYDRARGYRUS CALCINÄTUS. (*Olim, Merc. calc.*) L. Alterative, diaphoretic, gr. ss ad gr. ij, every night, joined with camphor and opium, each gr. $\frac{1}{2}$ or $\frac{1}{4}$. Violently emetic, and cathartic, gr. iv ad gr. v.

HYDRARGYRUS CUM CRĒTA. (*Olim, Merc. alkal.*) L.

L. Alterative; in cutaneous and venereal complaints, in obstructions of the viscera, or of the prostate gland, &c. gr. x ad 3fs, bis terve die.

HYDRARGYRUS MURIATUS. (*Olim, Merc. corros. subl.*) Alterative, antivenereal, gr. $\frac{1}{6}$ ad $\frac{1}{2}$ in the form of pill, or dissolved in a spoonful of brandy, once, twice, or thrice a day, with plentiful dilution to prevent its griping. Also in gargles for venereal ulcers in the throat, muriated quicksilver gr. iij or iv, barley decoction libj, honey of roses 3ij;—against tetter, &c. gr. v ad gr. x to water libj;—and for films and exulcerations of the cornea, gr. j to water 3iv.

HYDRARGYRUS MURIATUS MITIS. Alterative, anti-venereal, &c. in doses similar to those of calomel.

HYDRARGYRUS NITRATUS RUBER. (*Olim, Merc. corros. rub.*) In unguents stimulant, escharotic, 3j, or more, to wax ointment 3j. United with a triple or quadruple proportion of fine sugar, and blown into the eye, night and morn, it is useful, says Mr. Bell, against specks and films of the cornea; in which cases he adds further benefit may be derived from the daily use of a solution of vitriolated zinc, or verdigrise, at noon.

HYDRARGYRUS PRÆCIPITATUS CINEREUS. E. (*Hydrargyri, acidū nitroſi diluti, paria pondera.* Mix that the quicksilver may be dissolved, then dilute with water, and add a sufficient quantity of water of ammonia to separate the quicksilver from the acid; after which the powder is to be washed with pure water, and dried.) Alterative; in syphilis, &c. gr. j ad gr. v, night and morn. Also in the way of fumigation

migration like red sulphurated quicksilver, to which it is preferable, on account of its not yielding any vapour offensive to the patient.

HYDRARGYRUS PURIFICATUS. Mercury, or quicksilver. In constipations of the bowels, $\frac{3}{4}$ ss ad $\frac{3}{4}$ iv; but in these cases its utility may be justly doubted. Quicksilver $\frac{3}{4}$ vj, water $\frac{1}{2}$ bij; boil gently in a covered earthen vessel, 15 minutes, stirring the mercury frequently; when cold decant off the liquor for use: —dose to children, $\frac{3}{4}$ j ad $\frac{3}{4}$ ij, or more, bis die, against worms. See *Pil.* Externally, see *Empl. & Ung.*

HYDRARGYRUS CUM SULPHURE. (*Olim, Æthiops min.*) Alterative, vermifuge, $\frac{3}{4}$ j ad $\frac{3}{4}$ j, bis terve die.

HYDRARGYRUS SULPHURATUS RUBER. (*Olim, Cin-nab. fact.*) L. Alterative, $\frac{3}{4}$ j ad $\frac{3}{4}$ ss. Also in fumigation against venereal ulcers in the nose, mouth, or throat, venereal excrescences about the anus, &c. $\frac{3}{4}$ ss ad $\frac{3}{4}$ j, semel aut bis die.

HYDRARGYRUS VITRIOLATUS. (*Olim, Merc. emet. flav.*) Emetic, gr. ij ad gr. v. Also errhine; against amaurosis attended with dilatation of the pupil, &c. gr. $\frac{1}{4}$, or more, mixed with eight times its weight of liquorice powder, once or twice a day: where the nose is peculiarly dry, Mr. Ware advises the steam of warm water to be previously inhaled.

HYDROLAPATHUM, (i, n.) *radix*. Waterdock. E. Strongly astringent, deobstruent; in defæcations of the skin, &c. gr. xv ad $\frac{3}{4}$ j, in infusion $\frac{3}{4}$ ss ad $\frac{3}{4}$ ij, bis terve die. This root powdered is said to be an excellent dentifrice.

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HYOSCYĀMUS, (i, m.) *herba, semen.* Black henbane. *E.* Narcotic, diaphoretic, laxative, resolvent; in puerperal mania, and melancholy, in glandular swellings, scirrhus, cancer, hæmoptyfis, &c. gr. ij ad gr. x, or more, bis terve die. See *Suc.* Also externally to resolve swellings, and to allay pain in cases of scirrhus, rheumatism, &c. under the form of cataplasin of the leaves.

HYPĒRÍCUM, (i, n.) *flos.* St. John's-wort. *L.* Astringent, corroborant; in hysterical and hypochondriacal affections, &c. 3j ad 3j, bis, ter, quaterve die. In the leaves of this plant are to be found little vehicles containing an essential oil, somewhat resembling that of turpentine; on which there is reason to suppose its medicinal virtues principally depend.

HYSSŌPUS, (i, m.) *herba.* Hyssop. *E.* Stimulant, aromatic, attenuant, expectorant; in humoral asthmas, coughs, &c. 3j ad 3j, in infusion 3j ad 3ij, bis terve die. Externally in fomentations discutient; also in poultice against contusions, &c.

ICHTHÝOCÖLLA, (æ, f.) Fish-glue, or isinglass. *L.* Restorative, agglutinating, demulcent.

IMPĒRATORIÀ, (æ, f.) *radix.* Masterwort. *E.* Stimulant, stomachic, 3js, in infusion 3j, bis terve die. Also sialogogue.

INFŪSUM CATECHU. *E.* (*Catechu* 3ijs; *cort. cinnam.* 3js; *æq. ferventis, p.* 3vij; *syrupi simpl. p.* 3j. Macerate the catechu and cinnamon in the water two hours, in a close vessel; then strain, and add the

the syrup.) Astringent; in diarrhoeas, &c. $\frac{3}{j}$ ad $\frac{3}{ij}$.

INFUSUM GENTIANÆ COMPOSITUM. (*Gentianæ* $\frac{3}{j}$; *cort. limon.* rec. $\frac{3}{ss}$; *cort. aurant. exsic.* $\frac{3}{ss}$; *aq. fervent.* $\frac{3}{xij}$. Macerate an hour, and strain.) Tonic, stomachic, $\frac{3}{s}$ ad $\frac{3}{ij}$, bis terve die. Comp. infusion of gentian $\frac{3}{x}$, prepared kali $\frac{3}{j}$, spir. of juniper $\frac{3}{ij}$, taken at three doses, daily, stands recommended in ascites.

INFUSUM RHEI. E. (*Rad. rhabarbari* $\frac{3}{ss}$; *aque bullientis*, p. $\frac{3}{viiij}$; *spir. cinnamomi*, p. $\frac{3}{j}$. Macerate the rhubarb with the water, in a close vessel, for a night; then add the spir. of cinnamon, and strain.) Purgative, stomachic, $\frac{3}{s}$ ad $\frac{3}{ss}$.

INFUSUM ROSÆ. (*Rosar. rubr.* $\frac{3}{ss}$; *aq. dist. ferv.* $\frac{3}{bijss}$; *acidi vitriol. diluti*, p. $\frac{3}{ijj}$; *sacch. pur.* $\frac{3}{ss}$. First pour the water on the roses, then the acid, and macerate half an hour, in a glass vessel; when cold, strain, and add the sugar.) Subastringent, $\frac{3}{ij}$ ad $\frac{3}{vj}$.

INFUSUM SENNAE SIMPLEX. L. (*Sennæ* $\frac{3}{ss}$; *zincig. 3j*; *aq. fervent.* $\frac{1}{b}j$. Macerate an hour, in a covered vessel, and strain.) Purgative, $\frac{3}{ss}$ ad $\frac{3}{ij}$.

INFUSUM SENNAE TARTARISATUM. L. (*Sennæ* $\frac{3}{ss}$; *coriandri* $\frac{3}{ss}$; *cryst. tartari* $\frac{3}{ij}$; *aq. fervent.* $\frac{1}{b}j$.) Purgative, $\frac{3}{ss}$ ad $\frac{3}{ij}$.

INFUSUM TAMARINDORUM CUM SENNA. E. (*Fructus tamarind.* $\frac{3}{vj}$; *crystallorum tartari*, fol. *sennæ*, sing. $\frac{3}{j}$; *sem. coriandri* $\frac{3}{ss}$; *sacch. non puris.* $\frac{3}{ss}$; *aque bullient.* p. $\frac{3}{viiij}$. Macerate in a close earthen vessel, four hours, shaking it often, and strain.) Cooling, laxative, $\frac{3}{ij}$ ad $\frac{3}{iv}$.

IPECACUANHA, (a, f.) *radix*. Emetic, gr. x ad 3fs. Diaphoretic; in uterine haemorrhages, haemoptoë, coughs, diarrhoea, &c. gr. $\frac{1}{2}$ ad gr. $\frac{1}{2}$, or more. See *Pulv.* & *Vinum*.

IRIS, (idis, f.) *radix*. Florentine orris. Juice, in its turbid state, strongly acrid and cathartic; in dropfies, 3j ad 3ifs, largely diluted. In powder expectorant, 3j ad 3j. Also errhine.

IRIS PALUSTRIS, *radix*. Yellow waterflag. E. Undepurated juice strongly acrid and cathartic; in dropfies, gt. ix, largely diluted, every 2 or 3 hours till it operates, occasionally increased to 3ij. Also externally against serpiginous eruptions and scrofulous tumours. The fresh root of this species, is rather more acrid and cathartic than the preceding.

JALAPIUM, (i, n.) *radix*. Jalap. Cathartic, gr. x ad 3fs.—It is well suited to cold phlegmatic habits. See *Extr. Pulv.* & *Tinctura*.

JUGLANS, (dis, f.) *fructus immaturus*. The walnut-tree. L. Tonic, laxative, anthelmintic; against worms, &c. in infusion 3j ad 3ij, or more, ter die. Of a watery extract 3ij dissolved in cinnamon water 3fs,—dose, to children from two years old to three, gt. xx gradually increased to 1, ter die.

JUNIPERUS, (i, f.) *bacca, cacumen*. The juniper-tree. Stimulant, stomachic, diuretic, 3fs ad 3j. In infusion 3ij to boiling water libj. Also in decoction. See *Ol.* & *Spir.*

KALI ACETATUM. (*Olim, Sal diuret.*) Diaphoretic, diuretic, deobstruent, 3j ad 3ij. Laxative, diuretic, 3j ad 3ij, or more.

KALI PRÆPARĀTUM. (*Vice Sal absinth.*) Antacid, attenuant, diuretic, gr. v ad 3j, properly diluted. See *Aq.* In the aerated alkaline water, as directed by Dr. Falconer, the proportion of alkali is as 3j to water libv,—dose 3iv, bis, ter, quaterve die.

KALI PURUM. (*Olim, Lapis septicus.*)

KALI SULPHURĀTUM. (*Flor. sulph.* 3j; *kali ppti* 3v.) *L.* Diaphoretic; against herpetic eruptions, arsenical, mercurial and saturnine poisons, &c. gr. iij ad gr. viij, or more, ter quaterve die, followed by a plentiful draught of warm water. Also externally against tinea, and other cutaneous diseases, in the proportion of 3j ad 3ss to water libj.

KALI TARTĀRISĀTUM. (*Olim, Tart. solub.*) Aperient, 3j ad 3j. Purgative, 3ij ad 3ss, or more.

KALI VITRIOLĀTUM. (*Olim, Tart. vitriolat.*) Febrifuge, aperient, 3j ad 3ss. Mildly cathartic, 3iv ad 3v.

KINO, (n, indecl.) *rēsīna*. Astringent; in chronic diarrhoeas, leucorrhœas, laxity with acrimony, haemorrhages from the urethra, &c. gr. x ad 3j, or more. See *Tinet.*

LAC (tis, n.) AMMŌ NIĀCI. (*Ammon.* 3ss; *aq. dist.* 3ij.) Attenuant, expectorant, antispasmodic, 3iij ad 3j, or more.

LAC AMYGDĀLÆ. (*Amyg. dulc.* 3ss; *sacch. pur.* 3ss; *aqua* libj.) Cooling, demulcent; in hectic cases, against heat of urine, strangury, &c. 3ij ad 3v, ad libitum.

LACTŪCA VIRŌSA, *folia*. Wild lettuce. *E.* Narcotic, diuretic, laxative, resolvent. See *Succus*.

LADĀNUM, (i, n.) *rēsīna*. *L.* Stimulant, gr. x ad 3*ſs*. Externally, see *Emplastrum*.

LAPIS (īdis, m.) CALAMINĀRIS PRÆPĀRĀTUS. Astringent; in lotions for sore eyes, &c. See *Cerat*.

LAURUS, (us vel i, f.) *folium, bacca*. The bay-tree. Carminative, antispasmodic, gr. x ad 3*ſs*.—It is seldom employed internally. See *Oleum*.

LAVENDŪLA, (æ, f.) *flos*. Lavender. Stimulant, aromatic, 3*j* ad 3*j*. Also externally in fomentations for paralytic limbs. See *Oleum & Spiritus*.

LICHEN, (ēnis, m.) *herba*. Eryngo-leaved, or Iceland liverwort. *E.* Tonic, nutritive, demulcent. The dried plant boiled in water or milk, to the amount of 3*ſs* or 3*j*, daily, has of late been advantageously employed in phthisis, coughs, diarrheas, dysentery, &c. Lichen 3*j*, water 3*xx*; boil gently fifteen minutes, adding, towards the end, 3*iij* of liquorice-root,—dose, a tea cupful.

LIGUSTRICUM, (i, n.) *semen*. Lovage. *E.* Stimulant, aromatic, emmenagogue; in hysterical and uterine complaints, 3*ſs* ad 3*j*, in decoction or infusion 3*j* ad 3*iij*, bis terve die.

LILIUM (i, n.) ALBUM, *radix*. The white lily. *E.* Formed into a poultice with milk, emollient, suppurative.

LIMON, (ōnis, m.) *succus, cortex exterior*. Lemon. Juice cooling, antiseptic, restringent, 3*j* ad 3*ſs*. See *Syr.*

Syr. Peel stimulant, stomachic, in infusion, if fresh, 3js ad 3ij, daily. See *Aq. & Oleum.*

LINIMENTUM AMMONIÆ. (*Aq. ammoniae 3ss; ol. olivæ 3ss.*) Stimulant; against rheumatic and spasmodyc pains, paralytic numbnesses, &c.

LINIMENTUM AMMONIÆ FORTIUS. (*Aq. ammoniae puræ 3j; ol. olivæ 3ij.*) Rubefacient, &c. as the former.

LINIMENTUM AQUE CALCIS. E. (*Olei sem. lini, aquæ calcis, sing. partes æquales.*) Against burns, scalds, &c.

LINIMENTUM CAMPHORÆ COMPOSITUM. L. (*Camph. 3ij; aq. ammoniae puræ 3vj; spir. lavendulae, p. 3xvj.*) Stimulant, anodyne; against local spasmodyc pains, paralytic numbnesses, &c. This formulæ approaches to the volatile essence of the late Dr. Ward; it is of equal, if not of superior activity.

LINIMENTUM OPIATUM. E. (*Opii 3j; saponis albi Hisp. 3iv; camphoræ 3ij; ol. roris marini effent. p. 3s; spir. vini rect. p. libj.*) Digest the opium and soap in the spirit, three days; then to the strained liquor add the camphor and oil, diligently shaking the vessel.) Anodyne; to strained limbs, &c. One oz. contains 3j of opium.

LINIMENTUM SAPONIS COMPOSITUM. (*Saponis 3ij; camph. 3j; spir. roris marini libj.*) For rheumatic pains, bruises, sprains, &c. Compound liniment of soap, water of acetated ammonia, each 3j, water of pure ammonia 3ss, are said to form the celebrated remedy known under the name of *Steers's Opodeldoc.*

LINIMENTUM SIMPLEX. E. (*Ol. olivæ partes quatuor; ceræ albæ partem unam.*) Softening, healing to chaps, &c.

LINUM, (i, n.) *semen*. Flax,—the seed is called linseed. Emollient, demulcent. In infusion ʒj to water ℥vj. In poultice emollient, resolvent. See *Ol.*

LIQUOR (ōris, m.) VOLATILIS CORNU CERVI. (*Olim, Spir. cornu cervi.*) Stimulant, diaphoretic, antispasmodic, gt. xx ad ʒj, or more. Of this gt. x are reckoned to contain gr. j of the salt.

LITHARGYRUS, (i, m.) Litharge. See *Aq.* & *Empl.*

LIXIVA VITRIOLATA SULPHUREA. E. (*Olim, Sal polycryst.*) Cooling, aperient, gr. xv ad ʒſs.

LOBELIA, (æ, f.) *radix*. Blue cardinal-flower. E. Cathartic, antisyphilitic. This plant the American Indians consider as a specific in lues.—Of a decoction made with a handful of the dried roots in ℥vij of water boiled to ℥vij, half a pint is taken twice a day, then three times a day, & at last four times a day; unless its purgative effects become too violent, in which case the medicine is intermitted for a day or two, and then renewed till a cure is accomplished.

LUJULA, (æ, f.) *folium*. Wood-sorrel. Acid, cooling, restringent, juice ʒſs ad ʒiſs. See *Cons.*

MACIS, (idis, f.) Mace. Stimulant, carminative, stomachic, gr. x ad ʒj.

MAGNESIA ALBA. Antacid, ʒj ad ʒj.—These doses to children prove also laxative.

MAGNESIA USTA. Antacid, laxative. Being deprived

priv'd of carbonic acid, this has twice the strength of the former, and commonly requires plentiful dilution. See *Troch.* Calcined magnesia ʒj, given every three, four, or five hours, with ʒiſs of an infusion, made with crystals of tartar ʒj, tamarinds, manna, each ʒiſj, in decoction of barley lbj, has answered the purpose, it is said, of a gentle laxative, when other things have failed to stay on the stomach.

MAGNESIA VITRIOLATA. (*Olim, Sal cath. amar.*) Mildly cathartic; in colic pains, &c. ʒiſs ad ʒx. The more this is diluted, the less is the quantity required to procure the desired effect. In clysters laxative ʒiſs, or more.

MAJORANA, (æ, f.) *herba.* Sweet marjoram. Stimulant, aromatic, ʒj ad ʒj. Also sternutatory.

MALVA, (æ, f.) *folium, flos.* Common mallow. Emollient, ʒiſs ad ʒj, juice of the leaves ʒj ad ʒiſj. Also in fomentations, poultices, and clysters.

MANNA, (æ, f.) Gently laxative, ʒiſs ad ʒiſs, or more.

MARRUBIUM (i, n.) **ALBUM,** *herba.* White horehound. Stimulant, tonic, deobſtruuent; in cachexy, hysteria, pituitous asthmas, &c. ʒiſs ad ʒj, expressed juice ʒiſs ad ʒiſs, in infusion half a handful, or more, bis terve die.

MARUM (i, n.) **SYRIACUM,** *herba.* Herb-mastic. L. Stimulant, stomachic, gr. x ad ʒiſs. Also errhine.

MASTICHE, (es, f.) *rēsīna.* Mastic. Stimulant, corroborant, balsamic; in old coughs, weaknesses of the stomach, &c. gr. x ad ʒiſs, bis terve die. A fo-

Jution of this resin in oil of turpentine, is said to form an advertised remedy for the toothach.

MEL (mellis, n.) DESPUMĀTUM. Attenuant, aperient, 3ij ad 3j, or more. With some constitutions fresh honey greatly disagrees, an inconvenience which is commonly obviated by boiling. It is said, that honey excellently covers the taste of purging salts and waters.

MEL ACETĀTUM. L. (*Mellis desp. p. libij; aceti dist. libj.*) Cooling, expectorant, 3j ad 3ij. In gargles cooling, detergent.

MEL ROSÆ. L. In gargles cooling, detergent. Rose-honey 3js, muriatic acid gt. xx, or more, compose, says Van Swieten, an efficacious application for gangrene or scorbutic soreness of the mouth, to be used by means of a pencil brush, often in the day.

MEL SCILLÆ. L. (*Mellis desp. p. libij; tinct. scillæ libj.*) Boil to the consistence of a syrup.) Aperient, expectorant, detergent, 3js ad 3ij.

MELISSA, (æ, f.) herba. Balm. Stimulant, corroborant, gr. x ad 3ij.

MENTHA PIPERITIS, (idis.) herba. Peppermint. Stimulant, stomachic, carminative; in flatulent colics, hysterical depressions, &c. gr. x ad 3ij. See Aq. OL. & Spir.

MENTHA SATIVA, herba. Spearmint. Stimulant, stomachic, gr. x ad 3j. See Aq. Conf. OL. & Spir.

MEZERĒUM, (i, n.) radīcis cortex. Mezereon, or spurge-olive. Acrid, stimulant, alterative; against chronic eruptions, scirrous swellings, venereal nodes, &c. gr. j ad gr. x. See Decoc̄t. By directing a thin

a thin slice to be chewed as often as it could be borne, Dr. Withering relates, that he once cured an alarming difficulty of swallowing, seemingly arising from a paralytic affection.

MILLÉFOLIUM, (i, n.) *folia, flores.* Milfoil, or common yarrow. *E.* Tonic, astringent, aromatic; in internal haemorrhages, in diarrhoeas, various spasmodic affections, &c. $\frac{3}{4}$ j ad 3j, in infusion 3j ad 3ij, ter quaterve die.

MILLÉPEDA PRÆPARATA. Prepared woodlouse. Diuretic, deobstruent, 3j ad 3ij.

MINIUM (i, n.) Redlead. Astringent in plasters.

MISTURA CAMPHORATA. *L.* (*Camph.* 3j; *stir.* *vini rect.* gt. x; *sacch. pur.* 3ss; *aq. fervent.* lbj.) Antispasmodic; against nervous languors, &c. 3ss ad 3ij, or more.

MISTURA CRETACEA. (*Cretæ pptæ* 3j; *sacch. pur.* gr. xlv; *Arab. gum.* 3j; *aq. dist.* 3iv.) Astringent, antacid; in diarrhoeas, &c. 3ss ad 3ij.

MISTURA MOSCHATA. *L.* (*Aqua rosæ* 3ij; *moschi* $\frac{3}{4}$ j; *Arab. gummi*, *sacch. pur.* sing. 3ss. Rub the musk with the sugar, then with the gum, and add the rose-water gradually.) Diaphoretic, antispasmodic, 3ss ad 3ss, or more.

MÖRUM, (i, n.) Mulberry,—the fruit of the *morus*, mulberry-tree. *L.* Cooling, restringent. See *Syr.*

Moschus, (i, m.) *in folliculo prope umbilicum sito, collectus.* Musk. Diaphoretic, antispasmodic, gr. v ad $\frac{3}{4}$ j. See *Mift.* & *Tinct.* Musk, prepared ammonia, each gr. x, repeated every three hours, Mr. White has found serviceable in cases of gangrene accom-

panied with or occasioned by convulsive spasms, or arising from local injury producing symptoms of irritation, as singultus, subsultus tendinum, or the like.

MUCILAGO (inis, f.) AMYLI. (*Amyli 3ij; aquæ lbj.*) Demulcent; in diarrhœas, dysenteries, or tenesmus, 3iv ad 3vj, by way of clyster, with an opiate, occasionally.

MUCILAGO ARABICI GUMMI. (*Arab. gum. pulv. 3iv; aq. dist. fervent. 3vij.* Rub the gum with the water, until it is dissolved.) Demulcent; for coughs, &c. 3ss, or more.

MUCILAGO SEMINIS CYDONII MALI. L. (*Sem. cydon. mali 3j; aquæ 3vij.* Boil with a slow fire ten minutes, and strain.) Demulcent. Joined with syrup of mulberry and a little borax, it is useful against aphthæ of the mouth and fauces.

MUCILAGO TRAGACANTHÆ. (*Tragacanth. pulv. 3ss; aq. dist. 3x.* Macerate with a gentle heat until the tragacanth is dissolved.) As this mucilage has more tenacity than mucil. of gum Arab. it would seem better adapted for the making of troches, for the suspension of mercury, and the like.

MYRISTICA, (æ, f.) *fructus nūclēus, NUX MOSCHĀTA dictus.* The nutmeg-tree. Stimulant, aromatic, hypnotic, gr. v ad 3ij. See *Ol. & Spir.*

MYRRHA, (æ, f.) *gummi-rēsīna.* Myrrh. Stimulant, attenuant; in dylodia pulmonica, &c. gr. x ad 3ij, bis terve die. See *Pulv. & Tinct.* Rubbed with a fifth of camphor, it unites with water, both more readily and with greater permanency. Myrrh

$\frac{3}{2}$ j, prepared kali 3fs, vitriolated iron gr. xij, compose the famous medicine of Dr. Griffith; of which in slow hectic cases, &c. he was wont to begin with a fourth part, thrice a day, and then to increase the dose gradually to a third.

NASTURTIUM (i, n.) AQUATICUM, *herba recens.*
Watercress. Stimulant, attenuant, aperient, juice $\frac{3}{2}$ j ad $\frac{3}{2}$ ij, bis terve die.

NATRON (i, n.) PRÆPARATUM. (*Vulgo, Sal soda.*)
Antacid, attenuant, gr. x ad 3fs. Natron $\frac{3}{2}$ ij, cinchona $\frac{3}{2}$ j, mucilage of gum Arab. q. s. to form an electuary,—dose $\frac{3}{2}$ ij, bis terve die, in scrofula, &c.

NATRON TARTARISATUM. (*Vulgo, Sal Rupellenis.*)
Mildly cathartic, 3vj ad $\frac{3}{2}$ ifs. To the taste this salt is less nauseous than almost any other neutral.

NATRON VITRIOLATUM. (*Olim, Sal cath. Glaub.*)
• Cathartic; in habitual costiveness, bilious colics, &c. $\frac{3}{2}$ fs ad $\frac{3}{2}$ ifs. A poultice, consisting of vitriolated natron $\frac{3}{2}$ j, boiling water lbs, crumbs of bread q. s. Dr. Kirkland employs in those inflammations of the eye, where the secretions are deficient.

NICOTIANA, (æ, f.) *folium.* Tobacco. Narcotic, diuretic, sometimes emetic, expectorant, gr. fs ad gr. v. See *Vinum.* Also errhine, fialogogue. The fume, or $\frac{3}{2}$ fs ad $\frac{3}{2}$ j, or more, infused ten minutes in boiling water lbs, is employed by way of clyster for constipations of the bowels proceeding from spasm, incarcerated hernia, &c. The fume also in smoking is sometimes of use against chronic pains of the bowels, asthma, worms, &c. and in clyster against that species of worm called the ascarides.

NITRUM (i, n.) PURIFICĀTUM. Purified nitre. Refrigerent, diaphoretic, diuretic, gr. v ad 3fs. See *Troch.* In gargles attenuant, detergent, 3j in 3vj.

OLĒUM AMYGDĀLÆ. Emollient, demulcent, 3ij ad 3j, in the form of emulsion, repeatedly. To prepare neatly oleaginous emulsions by means of mucilage or yolk of egg, the only things, which demand attention, are, the gradual pouring of the oil to the whole of the uniting medium, so that it may be incorporated with this by little and little, and the using of water free from adventitious matters. Oil of almonds 3iv, water of acetated litharge gt. viij, form an useful injection to abate inflammation in gonorrhœa.

OLĒUM ANIMĀLE. Diaphoretic, antispasmodic, gt. x ad gt. xl.

OLĒUM ANISI ESSENTIĀLE. Stimulant, carminative, gt. v ad gt. xij.

OLĒUM CAMPHORĀTUM. E. (*Ol. olivæ 3ij; camphoræ 3fs.* Dissolve the camphor in the oil.) Externally anodyne, antispasmodic; in retentions of urine, rheumatic and other pains, ascites, &c.

OLĒUM CARŪI ESSENTIĀLE. L. Stimulant, carminative, gt. j ad gt. v.

OLĒUM CARYOPHILLI AROMATICI ESSENTIĀLE. L. Stimulant, aromatic, gt. iij ad gt. vj.

OLĒUM CINNAMOMI ESSENTIĀLE. L. Stimulant, stomachic, gt. j ad gt. iij.

OLĒUM CORNU CERVI. Externally stimulant; to benumbed or paralytic limbs.

OLĒUM JUNIPĒRI BACCÆ ESSENTIĀLE. Stimulant, carminative, stomachic, gt. ij ad gt. iv. Diuretic, detergent, gt. vj ad gt. x, or more.

OLĒUM LAURI BACCĀRUM EXPRESSUM. E. Externally anodyne, antispasmodic; against rheumatic pains, sprains, &c.

OLĒUM LAVENDŪLÆ ESSENTIĀLE. Stimulant; in nervous headachs and hysterick complaints, gt. j ad gt. v.

OLĒUM LIMŌNIS ESSENTIĀLE. Stimulant, stomachic, gt. ij ad gt. v. Also externally in unguents, as a perfume.

OLĒUM LĪNI E SEMINĪBUS. Emollient, demulcent, 3ſs ad 3j. In clysters 3ij ad 3vj, or more, against flatulent colics attended with costiveness, &c.

OLĒUM MENTHÆ PIPERITIDIS ESSENTIĀLE. Stimulant, carminative, stomachic, gt. j ad gt. iiij.

OLĒUM MENTHÆ SATIVÆ ESSENTIĀLE. Stimulant, carminative, stomachic, gt. ij ad gt. v.

OLĒUM MYRĪSTICÆ ESSENTIĀLE. (*Olim, Oleum nuci moschatae.*) Stimulant, aromatic, gt. ij ad gt. v.

OLĒUM MYRĪSTICÆ EXPRESSUM. (*Vulgo, Oleum macis.*) Externally in plasters, stimulant, antispasmodic.

OLĒUM OLIVÆ. Emollient, demulcent, 3ij ad 3j.

OLĒUM ORIGĀNI ESSENTIĀLE. Acrid, stimulant, gt. j ad gt. ij, or more. This, however, is seldom employed, except for easing the pains of carious teeth, and other external purposes.

OLĒUM PALMÆ. *E.* Externally against local pains, cramps, sprains, chilblains, &c.

OLĒUM PIMENTÆ ESSENTIĀLE. *E.* Stimulant, aromatic, gt. iij ad gt. v.

OLĒUM PULEGII ESSENTIĀLE. Stimulant, anti-spasmodic, gt. ij ad gt. v.

OLĒUM PETROLĒI. Stimulant, antispasmodic, gt. x ad gt. xxx. Also externally against rheumatic pains and paralytic weaknesses.

OLĒUM RÍCINI E SEMINIBUS. Mildly and speedily laxative, ʒſs ad ʒj, or more. Taken in a cup of coffee, its offensive taste is scarcely to be perceived.

OLĒUM RÖRIS MARINI ESSENTIĀLE. Stimulant; in nervous complaints, gt. ij ad gt. v.

OLĒUM SABÍNÆ ESSENTIĀLE. *E.* Stimulant, emmenagogue, gt. iij ad gt. v, or more.

OLĒUM SASSÄFRAS RADICIS ESSENTIĀLE. Stimulant, sudorific, gt. ij ad gt. x.

OLĒUM SINAPÉOS. *L.* Emollient, ʒſs ad ʒj.

OLĒUM SUCCINI. Externally stimulant; in liniments for weak or paralytic limbs, and rheumatic and spasmodic pains.

OLĒUM SUCCINI RECTIFICATUM. Stimulant, diuretic, antispasmodic; in hysterical disorders, epilepsy, &c. gt. x ad gt. xx, or more.

OLĒUM SULPHURATUM. (*Olim, Bals. sulph. simpl.*) Acrid, stimulant; for coughs, &c. gt. x ad gt. xx, bis terva die.

OLÉUM TEREBINTHINÆ. *L.* Externally stimulant; against rheumatic pains, sprains, &c. Oil of turpentine ʒj, oil of olive ʒjfs, vitriolic acid gt. xl, form an efficacious application for chronic affections of the joints from sprains or bruises.

OLÉUM TEREBINTHINÆ RECTIFICATUM. Stimulant, diuretic, sudorific; in sciatica and chronic rheumatism, gt. x ad ʒj, mixed with four times its quantity of honey, semel aut bis die, with plentiful dilution. Also against passive uterine haemorrhages, gt. x ad gt. xx. Oil of almonds ʒfs, oil of turpentine gt. xl,—of this Mr. Maule directs a little to be dropped into the ear, or applied at the end of a small dossier of cotton, in cases of deafness occasioned by defective, or diseased actions of the ceruminous glands.

OLÉUM VÍNI. *L.* Stimulant, anodyne, gt. j ad gt. iv.

OLÍBÁNUM, (*i.*, *n.*) *gummi-resina*. Stimulant, balsamic, ʒj ad ʒij, bis terve die.

OLÍVA, (*x.*, *f.*) *fructus oleum*. The olive-tree. See *Oleum*.

OPÍUM PURIFICATUM. Anodyne, narcotic, gr. fs ad gr. ij, or more. See *Elephant. Pil. Pulv. & Tinct.* Externally, see *Lin.*

OPÓPÁNAX, (*äcis*, *f.*) *gummi-resina*. Antispasmodic, attenuant, deobstruent, gr. x ad ʒfs.

ORÍGÁNUM, (*i.*, *n.*) *herba*. Wild marjoram. Stimulant, gr. x ad ʒj. See *Ol.*

OSTRĒÆ TESTA PRÆPĀRĀTA. Prepared oyster-shell. Antacid, absorbent, 3*ss* ad 3*j.*

OVUM, (i, n.) Egg. Nutritive, restorative. The raw egg, taken three or four times a day, including the yolk and white, has been often serviceable in obstinate jaundice proceeding from viscid bile or gluten, obstructing the biliary ducts.

OXÝMEL (mellis, n.) ÆRUGINIS. L. (*Ærug. pptæ*
3*j.*; *aceti* 3*vij*; *mel. desp. p.* 3*xiv.*) Externally detergent, and to keep down fungous flesh. When sufficiently diluted, it serves as an useful application to scrofulous sores, and is often of service to venereal ulcerations of the mouth and fauces. When employed with this last intention, however, great care should be taken, that none of it be swallowed.

OXÝMEL COLCHÍCI. L. (*Colch. rec.* 3*j.*; *acet. dist.*
1*bij*; *mel. desp. p.* 1*bij*. Boil to the consistence of a syrup.) Acrid, diuretic; in dropsy, &c. 3*j* gradually increased to 3*j*, or more, bis die. Inspissated juice of elder-berry 3*j*, jalap 3*vij*, ginger 3*vij*, vitriolated kali 3*ss*, oxymel of meadow-saffron 3*ss*, mix and make an electuary;—dose, 3*vij* ad 3*vij*, in dropfies.

OXÝMEL SCILLÆ. L. (*Mel. desp. p.* 1*bijj*; *aceti*
scillæ 1*bij*. Boil to the consistence of a syrup.) Expectorant, detergent, 3*ss* ad 3*vij*.

PALMA, (æ, f.) *fructus oleum expressum*. The palm-tree. E. See *Oleum*.

PAPĀVER (čris, n.) ALBUM, *capsula*. White poppy. Anodyne, narcotic. See *Extr.* & *Syr.* Also externally in the way of fomentation to inflamed or ulcerated

cerated parts,—dried poppyheads ʒiv, water ℥vj; boil to ℥bij.

PAPĀVER ERRATĪCUM, *flos.* Wild poppy. *L.*
Slightly narcotic. See *Syrupus.*

PAREĪRA BRAVA, *radix.* *L.* Detergent, expectorant, diuretic; in ulcerous nephritic and calculous complaints, gr. xv ad ʒij, in decoction ʒj ad ʒiij, in a pretty large quantity of water, bis terve die. To the taste this root discovers much sweetneſs, ſome bitterness, and a flight astringency.

PARIETĀRĪA, (æ, f.) *herba.* Pelliſory of the wall. Emollient, diuretic, gr. x ad ʒj, or more, juice ʒj ad ʒiij. In cataplaſms emollient, diſcutient.

PENTĀPHYLLUM, (i, n.) *radix.* Cinque-foil. *L.* Astringent, ʒſs ad ʒj, or more. In gargles for the guns, ſtrengthening.

PETROLĒUM, (i, n.) Barbadoes tar. Inwardly, ſee *Ol.* Externally ſtimulant, diſcutient. As a powerful diſſolver of thickened lymph in diſeases of the hip and other joints, Dr. Kirkland advises Barbadoes tar ʒſs, united with water of pure ammonia ʒſs.

PETROLĒUM SULPHURĀTUM. (*Flor. sulph.* ʒiv; *ol. petrolei,* p. ʒxvj. Boil till they unite into a maſſ.) Stimulant, balsamic, gt. v ad gt. xx, bis terve die.

PETRŌSĒLĪNUM, (i, n.) *radix, semen.* Parsley. Root nutritive, aperient, diuretic: ſeed ſtimulant, carminative, diuretic, ʒj ad ʒij.

PILŪLÆ ALŌEſ COMPOSIȚÆ. (*Aloes ſoc.* ʒj; *extr. gentianæ* ʒſs; *ol. carui effent.* ʒij; *fyr. zingib.* q. s.) Purgative, ſtomachic, gr. x ad gr. xxv.

PILULÆ ALÖES CUM MYRRHA. (*Aloes soc.* 3ij; *myrrhae, croci, sing.* 3j; *syr. croci q.s.*) Laxative, stomachic, gr. x ad 3j.

PILULÆ CUPRI. E. (*Cupri ammoniaci gr.* xvij; *micæ panis* 3iv; *aq. ammoniacæ q.s.* Make a mass to be divided into thirty-two pills.) For their virtues and dose, see *Cuprum ammoniacum.*

PILULÆ GALBANI COMPOSITÆ. (*Galbani, opopanaxis, myrrhae, sagapeni, sing.* 3j; *asæ faetide* 3ss; *syr. croci q.s.*) Stimulant, antispasmodic, emmenagogue; in hysterical, hypochondriacal and other nervous complaints, gr. x ad 3ss, bis terve die.

PILULÆ HYDRARGYRI. (*Hydrarg. pur. p.* 3ij; *conf. roxa rubra* 3ij; *pulv. glycyrrb.* 3j.) Alterative, anti-venercal, &c. gr. v.ad gr. xv, or more, bis terve die.

PILULÆ HYDRARGYRI MURIATI MITIS, SIVE CALOMELANOS COMPOSITÆ. E. (*Hydrarg. muriati mitis, fulphuris antimoniæ præcipitati, sing.* 3ij; *extr. gentianæ, saponis, sing.* 3j. Grind the mild muriated quicksilver with the precipitated sulphur of antimony, that they may be intimately mixed; then add the extract and soap, and with simple syrup form them into a mass.) Alterative; in chronic eruptions, &c. gr. iij ad gr. x, or more, bis die. A pill of gr. iij, contains little more than gr. j of calomel.

PILULÆ OPII. (*Opii purif.* 3ij; *extr. glycyrrb.* 3j.) Anodyne. Five gr. contain one of opium.

PILULÆ RHEI COMPOSITÆ. E. (*Rad. rhabarbari* 3ij; *aloes soc.* 3ss; *myrrhae* 3j; *kali vitriolati* gr. xv; *ol.*

ol. menthae sativae effent. gr. viij; *fyr. cort. aurant.* q.s.) Laxative, stomachic, gr. xv ad 3fs.

PILULÆ SCILLÆ. (*Scill. exsic.* 3j; *zingib. saponis,* sing. 3ij; *ammon. purif.* 3ij; *fyr. zingib.* q.s.) Attenuant, expectorant, diuretic, gr. x ad 3j, bis terve die. Ten gr. contain about gr. j of dried squill.

PIMENTO, (n. indecl.) *bacca.* Jamaica pepper, or allspice. Stimulant, aromatic, carminative, gr. v ad 3j. See *Aq. Ol. & Spiritus.*

PIMPINELLA, (æ, f.) *radix.* Burnet saxifrage, *E-*Acrid, stomachic, diuretic, resolvent; in weaknesses of the stomach from viscid phlegm, infarctions of the breast, dropsy, &c. 3j ad 3fs, in infusion 3j ad 3ij, bis terve die. Also fialogogue.

PIPER (ēris, n.) INDICUM, *capsula.* Guinea pepper, or capsicum. Stimulant, aromatic; in atonic gout, palsey, &c. gr. v ad gr. x, or more, under the form of pills.

PIPER LONGUM, *fructus.* Long pepper. Stimulant, aromatic, gr. v ad 3j. Also fialogogue.

PIPER NIGRUM, *bacca.* Black pepper. Similar to the preceding.

PIX (icis, f.) BURGUNDICA. Burgundy pitch. Externally stimulant, anodyne. See *Empl.*

PIX LIQUIDA. Tar. Stimulant, diaphoretic, diuretic, deobstruent; in cold, languid phlegmatic habits, 3j ad 3i. To make tar-water, mix tar libj with water one gallon, stir them frequently, and in two days decant off the liquor; which, warm or cold, may be drunk, partitis haustibus, from libj to libj, daily.

daily. Externally, see *Ung.* Tar exsiccated by heat
ʒix, yellow wax ʒivis, oil of olive liss, which com-
pose nearly the black basilicon of the old dispensa-
tory, Dr. Kirkland advises as a beneficial application
to those purple, glassy ulcers, in which there exists
an extraordinary degree of irritability.

PLANTĀGO, (inis, f.) *folia*. Common great plan-
tain. E. Subastringent, refrigerant, attenuant, diu-
retic; in phthisis, hæmoptysis, hæmatemesis, &c.
juice, ʒj ad ʒij, bis terve die. Also in infusion.

PRŪNUM (i, n.) GALLICUM. French plum,—the
fruit of the *prunus gallica*, French plum-tree. Cool-
ing, laxative.

PRŪNUM SYLVESTRE. Sloe,—the fruit of the *pru-
nus sylvestris*, the blackthorn or sloe-bush. Cooling,
astringent. See *Conserua*.

PULEGIUM, (i, n.) *herba, flos*. Pennyroyal. Stim-
ulant, antispasmodic, expectorant, emmenagogue,
gr. x ad ʒij. See *Aq. Ol. & Spir.*

PULSATILLA NIGRICANS, *herba cum floribus*. Mead-
ow-anemone. E. Acrid, stimulant, resolvent. See
Extractum.

PULVIS ALÖES CUM CANELLA. L. (*Aloes* soc. ʒiv;
canella alba ʒij.) Cathartic, deobstruent, gr. x ad ʒij.

PULVIS ALÖES CUM FERRO. L. (*Aloes* soc. ʒiv;
myrrhae ʒij; *extr. gentianæ exsic.* ferri vitriol. sing.
ʒj.) Aperient, deobstruent; in chlorotic cases, &c.
gr. v ad gr. x, bis die; or gr. x ad ʒij, or more,
every, or every other night.

PULVIS

PULVIS ALÖËS CUM GUÄIÄCO. L. (*Aloës soc. ʒiss; guaiaci gummi-resinæ ʒj; pulv. aromat. ʒfs.*) Warm, aperient, laxative; in dyspeptic and spasmodic complaints of the stomach and bowels, gr. x ad ʒj.

PULVIS ALUMINIS COMPOSITUS. E. (*Aluminis ʒss; kino ʒj.* Rub them together to a fine powder.) Tonic, astringent; in uterine haemorrhages, &c. gr. x ad ʒfs.

PULVIS ANTIMONIALIS. Febrifuge, sudorific, gr. v ad gr. x, or more. Alterative, diaphoretic, gr. j ad gr. iij.

PULVIS AROMATICUS. (*Cinnam. ʒjj; sem. cardam. ʒingib. piperis longi, sing. ʒj.*) Stimulant, carminative, stomachic, gr. v ad gr. x, or more.

PULVIS ASARI COMPOSITUS. (*Asari, majoranæ, mari Syriaci, lavend. sing. excic. ʒj.*) Errhine, gr. v ad ʒj. This preparation is equal to any of the powders sold under the name of *Herb Snuff*.

PULVIS CERUSSÆ COMPOSITUS. L. (*Cerussæ ʒv; sarcocollæ ʒiss; tragacanthæ ʒss.*) Externally cooling, astringent; in collyria, lotions, and injections, ʒj in ʒiv. Comp. powder of ceruse ʒj, vitriolated zinc gr. vj, rose-water ʒiv, form an injection, which is successfully used in the inflammatory stage of gonorrhœa.

PULVIS CHELARUM CANCRI COMPOSITUS. L. (*Cancri chelar. præp. ʒiv; cretae pptæ, corallii rubri, sing. ʒj.*) Antacid, astringent, ʒfs ad ʒiss.

PULVIS CONTRAYERVÆ COMPOSITUS. L. (*Contrayervæ ʒv; pulv. chelar. cancri comp. ʒfs.*) Stimulant, diaphoretic, ʒj ad ʒij, or more.

PULVIS

PULVIS CRĒTÆ COMPOSITUS. L. (*Cretæ pptæ līss;*
cinnam. ʒiij; tormentillæ, Arab. gummi, sing. ʒiij; pi-
peris longi ʒss.) Astringent, stomachic, carminative,
 Əj ad Əij.

PULVIS CRĒTÆ COMPOSITUS CUM OPIÙ. L. (*Pulv.*
cretæ comp. ʒvij; opii giss.) Astringent, stomachic,
 carminative, gr. xv ad Əij. Two scr. contain nearly
 gr. j of opium.

PULVIS IPECACÜANHÆ COMPOSITUS, (*Ipecac. opii,*
sing. ʒj; kali vitriol. ʒj.) Sudorific; in rheumatisms,
 dropfy, &c. gr. vj ad gr. xv.

PULVIS JALAPPÆ COMPOSITUS. E. (*Rad. jalapii*
ʒj; tartari crystallorum ʒij. Mix, and diligently
 grind them together for soime time, so as to form a
 very fine powder.) Purgative, Əj ad Əij, or more.

PULVIS MYRRHÆ COMPOSITUS. L. (*Myrrhæ, sa-*
binae, rutaæ, cañorei Russ. sing. ʒj.) Stimulant, anti-
 spasmodic, emmenagogue; in uterine obstructions
 and hysterical disorders, gr. xv ad Əij, bis terve die.

PULVIS OPIĀTUS. L. (*Opii ʒj; cornu cervi usq;*
ʒix.) Anodyne, absorbent, gr. v ad gr. x, or more.

PULVIS SCAMMÖNII COMPOSITUS. (*Scam. extr.*
jalapii, sing. ʒij; zingib. ʒss.) Cathartic, gr. x ad
 gr. xv.

PULVIS SCAMMÖNII CUM ALÖE. L. (*Scam. ʒvj;*
extr. jalapii, aloes soc. sing. ʒss; zingib. ʒss.) Ca-
 thartic, gr. x ad gr. xv.

PULVIS SCAMMÖNII CUM CALOMËLÄNE. L. (*Scam.*
ʒss; calomel. facch. pur. sing. ʒij.) Cathartic, vermi-
 fuge, gr. x ad Əj. Four gr. contain one of calomel.

PULVIS SENNAE COMPOSITUS. *L.* (*Sennæ, tartari crystal. sing. ʒij; scammonii ʒſſ; zingib. ʒij.*) Cathartic, ʒj ad ʒj.

PULVIS TRAGACANTHÆ COMPOSITUS. *L.* (*Tragacanth. Arab. gummi, amyli, sing. ʒiſſ; sacch. pur. ʒiſſ.*) Demulcent; in hectic cases, tickling coughs, strangury, &c. ʒſſ ad ʒſſ.

PYRÉTHRUM, (thri, n.) *radix*. Pellitory of Spain. Acrid, stimulant, attenuant; in paralytic and other complaints, gr. iij ad ʒj, bis, ter, quaterve die. Also errhine, fialogogue. In gargles for loss of speech, palfies of the tongue, &c.—ʒſſ ad ʒj boiled in water 1bj to 1bj.

QUASSIA, (æ, f.) *lignum, cortex, radix*. Tonic, stomachic, gr. v ad ʒj, or ʒj ad ʒij, or more, of an infusion made by macerating ʒij, an hour or two, in boiling water 1bj.

QUERCUS, (ūs, f.) *cortex*. The oak. Strongly astringent, gr. xv ad ʒſſ, or ʒj ad ʒij of an infusion made with ʒj to boiling water 1bj. Such as are liable to be affected with cynanche from a slight application of cold, says Dr. Cullen, may often prevent or soon remove the disease, by gargling with a strong decoction or infusion of oak-bark, to 1bj of which ʒſſ of alum and ʒij of brandy are added.

RADIX (īcis, f.) INDICA LOPEZIĀNA. *E.* Tonic, stomachic; in phthisical diarrhoeas, &c. ʒj ad ʒij, ter quaterve die.

RĀPHĀNUS (i, m.) RUSTICĀNUS, *radix*. Horseradish. Stimulant, attenuant, diuretic, ʒj ad ʒj. Also fialogogue.

sialogogue. Hoarseness, says Dr. Cullen, has been often speedily removed, when depending on the interrupted secretion of the mucus of the fauces, by syrup of horseradish, a tea-spoonful or two being swallowed leisurely and often.—Fresh root scraped ʒij, boiling water ʒiv, macerate two hours; to the strained liquor add double its weight of sugar, and make a syrup. According to Dr. Withering, an infusion of horseradish in milk makes one of the safest and best cosmetics.

RESINA FLAVA. Yellow rosin. Externally, see Cerat. & Ung.

RHABARBĀRUM, (i, n.) radix. Rhubarb. Purgative, astringent, stomachic, gr. x ad ʒij. See Infus. Pil. Tinet. & Vin. Also externally to promote the granulation and healing of ulcers, sprinkled once or twice a day: should it prove too irritating, the addition of a ninth part opium may be usefully made.

RHÖDÖDENDRON, (dri, n.) folia. E. Acrid, narcotic, tonic, subastringent; in rheumatism, gout, &c. gr. v ad gr. x, or more, bis terve die; or ʒis ad ʒij infused for a night in boiling water ʒix, every morn, drinking nothing after it for some time.

RIBES (is, n.) NIGRUM, fructus. Black currant. L. Subacid, cooling. See Succus, & Syrupus.

RIBES RUBRUM, fructus. Red currant. L. Subacid, cooling.

RICINUS, (i, m.) semen. Palma Christi. See Oleum. The seed itself, in the quantity even of a few grains, operates too violently for exhibition.

ROSA DAMASCENA, *petalum*. The damask rose. Laxative, aromatic, ʒij ad ʒij. See Syr.

ROSA RUBRA, *petalum*. The red rose. Subastrigent, ʒij ad ʒij. See Conf. Infus. Mel, & Syr.

Ros (oris, m.) MARINUS, *cacumen, flos*. Rosemary. Stimulant, antispasmodic; against nervous headachs, sinkings, &c. gr. x ad ʒij, in infusion ʒij ad ʒis. See Ol. & Spir.

RÜBIA, (æ, f.) *radix*. Madder. Astringent, aperient, diuretic, emmenagogue, ʒis ad ʒij, or more, ter quaterve die.

RÜBUS (i, m.) IDÆUS, *fructus*. The raspberry-bush. L. Grateful, cooling. See Syr.

RÜTA, (æ, f.) *herba*. Rue. Tonic, attenuant, diuretic, antispasmodic, gr. xv ad ʒij. See Extr.

SABINA, (æ, f.) *folium*. Savin. Stimulant, antispasmodic, aperient, diuretic; in cold phlegmatic habits, gr. xv ad ʒij, bis terve die. See Extr. Ol. & Tinet. Externally escharotic; to venereal warts, condylomata, &c. with or without an equal proportion of verdigrise, sprinkled once a day.

SACCHÄRUM NON PURIFICÄTUM. Brown sugar. Nutritive, attenuant, laxative.

SACCHÄRUM PURIFICÄTUM. Double-refined sugar. Nutritive. Externally escharotic.

SAGAPÉNUM, (i, n.) *gummi-resina*. Aperient, deobstruent, antispasmodic; in hysterick cases, palsies, &c. gr. v ad ʒis, ter die.

SAL (salis, m. vel n.) AMMÖNIÄCUS. Aperient, F 2 diaphoretic,

diaphoretic, diuretic, gr. x ad 3ss. Externally in fomentations discutient, resolvent, ʒj in some appropriate liquor ℥ij. As a discutient lotion, sal ammoniac ʒss, vinegar, rect. spir. each ℥ij, have been advantageously employed. Soap ʒij, litharge-plaster ʒss, sal amm. ʒj, compose the volatile plaster of Dr. Kirkland; from which, it seems, in chronic enlargements of the knee and elbow joints, or what have been termed cold tumours, he has seen astonishing good effects.—The litharge-plaster and soap are to be melted together, and, when nearly cold, the sal ammoniac powdered is to be stirred in.

SAL CORNU CERVI. Stimulant, diaphoretic, antispasmodic, gr. v ad gr. xv, or more.

SAL SUCCINI PURIFICATUS. Aperient, diuretic, antispasmodic; in hysterical and hypochondriacal affections attended with anxiety and sinking of spirits, gr. v ad ʒj, bis, ter, quaterve die. To the taste this salt is penetrating, acid, and subastringent.

SAL MURIATICUS. Common salt. Stimulant, cathartic. In clysters stimulant, purgative, ʒij ad ʒss.

SALIX, (īcis, f.) ramulorum cortex. The willow. E. Tonic, astringent; in intermittents, &c. ʒij ad ʒj.

SALVIA, (æ, f.) folium. Sage. Stimulant, diaphoretic, stomachic, gr. xv ad ʒij. In gargles detergent. This plant, says Van Swieten, is useful in restraining the too long continued and weakening flow of milk from the breasts of nurses, after the weaning of children.

SAMBŪCUS, (i, f.) *cortex interior, flos, bacca.* Common elder. Bark cathartic, hydragogue; in dropsies, &c. gr. v ad 3j, in infusion 3j per diem, expressed juice 3j ad 3ss pro dosi. Flowers in fermentations discutient. See *Ung.* Berries aperient, deobstruent. See *Succus.*

SANGUIS (inis, m.) DRACŌNIS, *resīna.* Dragons-blood. Astringent, gr. x ad 3ij. Externally in plasters, corroborant.

SANTĀLUM CITRĪNUM, *lignum.* Yellow sanders. E. Tonic, stimulant, aromatic, 3j ad 3j.

SANTĀLUM RUBRUM, *lignum.* Red sanders. This is principally used as a colouring drug; it imparts a strong red colour to spirits only.

SANTONĪCUM, (i, n.) *cacūmen.* Wormseed. Sub-acrid, tonic, stomachic, vermifuge, 3ss ad 3j, bis die. Wormseed, tansy-flowers, each 3j, vitriolated iron 3j, form an approved composition for worms;—dose, gr. x ad 3ss, bis terve die.

SAPO, (ōnis, m.) Soap. Aperient, diuretic, detergent, gr. x ad 3ss, bis terve die. Lithontriptic, 3ss ad 3j, daily.

SARCŌCÖLLA, (æ, f.) *gummi-resīna.* L. Tonic, gr. xv ad 3ss. Externally to wounds and ulcers, conglutinating.

SARSAPARILLA, (x, f.) *radix.* Alterative, diaphoretic; in powder 3j ad 3j, or more, ter die. See *Decocēt.*

SASSÄFRAS, (n. indecl.) *lignum, radix, ejusque cor-*

tex. Stimulant, aperient, diaphoretic, 3j ad 3j, in decoction or infusion 3fs ad 3j, bis die.

SÄTYRION, (i, n.) *radix*. Orchis. E. Nutritive, demulcent; in diarrhoeas, dysentery, dysury, hectic fever from absorption of pus, &c. A preparation of this root forms the salep of the shops.

SCAMMÖNIUM, (i, n.) *gummi-resina*. Scammony. Cathartic, gr. v ad gr. xv, well triturated with an equal proportion of crystals of tartar, sugar, or the like. See *Elect. & Pulv.*

SCILLA, (æ, f.) *radix*. Squill, or seaonion. Acrid, expectorant, diuretic, fresh squill gr. v ad gr. xv, dried squill gr. j ad gr. iij, bis terve die. When larger doses are given, it proves commonly emetic, sometimes cathartic. See *Conf. Mel, Oxym. Pil. Tinct. & Syr.*

SCOLOPENDRIUM, (i, n.) *herba*. Hartstongue. E. Mucilaginous, astringent; in visceral obstructions, &c. 3fs ad 3j, ter die.

SCORDIUM, (i, n.) *herba*. Water-germander. Tonic, diaphoretic; in malignant fevers attended with laxity of the bowels, &c. 3j ad 3j, or more.

SENÉKA, (æ, f.) *radix*. Rattlesnake-root. Acrid, diaphoretic, diuretic, cathartic, 3j ad 3fs, bis, ter, quaterve die. See *Decoct.*

SENNA, (æ, f.) *folium*. Cathartic, 3j ad 3j. See *Elect. Extr. Infus. Pulv. & Tinct.*

SERPENTARIA VIRGINIANA, *radix*. Snakeroot. Tonic, aromatic, stimulant, diaphoretic; in low fevers, atonic gout, mortifications, &c. gr. x ad 3fs, in

in decoction or infusion ʒſs ad ʒj, or more. See *Tinct.*

SERPÝLLUM, (i, n.) *summitates florentes*. Wild or mother of thyme. *E.* Stimulant, aromatic, anti-spasmodic, gr. x ad ʒij.

SĒVUM OVĪLLUM PRÆPĀRĀTUM. Mutton-suet. Boiled in milk, this is sometimes used in diarrhoeas of the chronic kind. Also externally in unguents.

SIMAROŪBA, (æ, f.) *cortex*. Tonic, stomachic; in the last stage of dysentery, in diarrhoeas from absorption of pus, habitual colics with bloody stools, &c. gr. x ad ʒſs pro dosi, or ʒij ad ʒijj boiled in water ſbis to ʒxij, per diem. This bark Dr. Cullen considers in the light only of a simple bitter.

SINĀPI, (n. indecl.) *semen*. Mustard. Stimulant, attenuant; in paralytic and rheumatic complaints, &c. ʒj ad ʒſs, whole or only lightly bruised, bis die. To make mustard-whey, of which a tea cupful is usually taken for a dose, boil ſbij of milk till it curdles, with two or three table-spoonfuls of the seed newly bruised, and strain. Externally, see *Catapl.*

SÍUM, (i, n.) *herba*. Water-parsnep. *L.* Diuretic, antiscorbutic; in chronic eruptions, juice ʒij, or more, bis die, with milk, which makes it less nauseous to the taste.

SODA (æ, f.) PHOSPHÓRĀTA. *E.* Mildly cathartic, ʒſs ad ʒj, or more, dissolved in a basin of broth, beef tea, or the like. Thus taken, it is said to be not unpleasant to the palate, having much the same flavour as common salt.

SPERMA (ātis, n.) CĒTI. Emollient, demulcent; in pains and erosions of the intestines, coughs, &c. ʒſs ad ʒiſs. Externally, see *Cerat.* & *Ung.*

SPIGELIA, (æ, f.) radix. Indian pink. Sedative, laxative, anthelmintic; in low remittent worm-fevers, &c. to children of four or five years old, gr. viij ad gr. xij, in infusion ʒj, or more; to adults, in powder ʒſs ad ʒij, in decoction or infusion ʒiſs or more, bis die. Should it fail to produce a laxative effect, a purge with calomel ought to be occasionally interposed.

SPINA CERVINA, bacca. Buckthorn. Cathartic, juice ʒſs ad ʒj. See *Syr.*

SPIRITUS (us, m.) AETHĒRIS NITRŌSI. (*Olim, Spir. nitri dulcis.*) Febrifuge, diuretic, antispasmodic, gt. xx ad ʒj, or more. United with a small quantity of spirit of ammonia, it is said to be diaphoretic, and often notably diuretic.—It is good also against nephritic & colic pains, joined with oil of almonds ʒſs.

SPIRITUS AETHĒRIS VITRIOLICI. (*Olim, Spir. vitrioli dulcis.*) Diaphoretic, diuretic, anti-spasmodic, ʒj ad ʒiſs, or more. Spir. of vitriolic ether ʒj, decoction of barley ʒvj, syrup of marshmallow ʒſs, form a good discutient gargle in cases of slight inflammation of the fauces.

SPIRITUS AETHĒRIS VITRIOLICI AROMATĪCUS. E. (*Cort. cinnam. ʒvj; sem. cardam. ʒj; rad. angelicæ ʒiſj; piperis longi ʒij; spir. aetheris vitriolici, r. 1bijſs.* Macerate seven days, in a close vessel, and when the feces have subsided, pour off the clear.) Stimulant, stomachic, gt. xx ad lx, or more.

SPIRITUS

SPIRITUS AETHÉRIS VITRIOLICI COMPOSITUS. L. (*Spir. aetheris vitriol. p. libij; ol. vini, p. 3ij.*) This is supposed to be the *Liquor anodynus mineralis* of Hoffman; and, in doses of from 3fs to 3ifs, is given in hysterical, arthritic and other painful complaints.

SPIRITUS AMMONIÆ. (*Olim, Spir. salis amm. dulcis.*) Stimulant, attenuant, diaphoretic, antispasmodic, gt. xv ad gt. lx, or more. Of this, which consists of rectified spirit and ammonia, gt. xv contains scarcely gr. j of the salt.

SPIRITUS AMMONIÆ COMPOSITUS. (*Spir. ammon. libij; ol. limonis effent.—caryoph. aromat. eff. sing. P. 3ij.*) Stimulant, sudorific, antispasmodic, gt. xv ad lx, or more.

SPIRITUS AMMONIÆ FŒTIDUS. (*Olim, Spir. volat. fœtidus.*) Stimulant, antispasmodic; in spasmodic asthmas, gout in the stomach or bowels, &c. gt. xxx ad 3j, or more.

SPIRITUS AMMONIÆ SUCCINATUS. L. (*Alkoholis, p. 3j; aq. ammoniæ puræ 3iv; ol. succini rect. p. 3j; saponis gr. x.*) This, under the name of *Eau de luce*, is principally used for smelling to in lownesses and faintings. As a powerful stimulant and diaphoretic, however, it is sometimes given internally from gt. xv to gt. lx, on the sudden subsiding of exanthemata, and receding of arthritic appearances from the extremities.

SPIRITUS ANISI COMPOSITUS. L. (*Sem. anisi,—angelicæ, sing. libj; spir. vin. ten. cong. j.*) Stimulant, carminative, stomachic, 3ij ad 3j, or more.

SPIRITUS

SPIRITUS CAMPHORATUS. (*Camph.* ʒiv; *spir.* vini reet. libj.) Externally against rheumatic pains, paralytic numbnesses, tumours, gangrene, sprains, &c. It is said to be efficacious also in checking an incipient whitlow, a linen compress being made wet with it, and thus kept constantly applied.

SPIRITUS CARUI,—CINNAMOMI. Of either ʒij ad ʒj, or more.

SPIRITUS JUNIPERI COMPOSITUS. (*Bac. junip.* libj; *sem. carui*,—*fænic. dulc.* sing. ʒis; *spir. vin. ten. cong.* j.) Stimulant, carminative, ʒij ad ʒvj, or more.

SPIRITUS LAVENDULÆ. Used principally as a perfume.

SPIRITUS LAVENDULÆ COMPOSITUS. (*Spir. lavend.* libjj;—*rorismarini libj*; *cinnam. nuc. fruct. myrist.* sing. ʒs; *santali rubri ʒj.*) Stimulant, antispasmodic; against nervous languors, &c. ʒls ad ʒij.

SPIRITUS MENTHÆ PIPERITIDIS,—MENTHÆ SATIVÆ, L.—MYRISTICÆ,—PIMENTO,—PULEGII. L. Of these severally ʒij ad ʒj, or more.

SPIRITUS RAPHANI COMPOSITUS. L. (*Raph. rust. cort. aurant. exfic.* sing. libj; *cochleariae rec.* libv; *nuc. fruct. myrist.* ʒj; *spir. vin. ten. cong.* ij.) Stimulant, antiscorbutic, ʒij ad ʒj.

SPIRITUS RÖRISMARINI. This, it is said, diluted with water, removes sunburnings of the skin. Sal ammoniac ʒij, water, spirit of rosemary, each libj, Mr. Justamond recommends for removing coagulation of the milk in the breasts of women after lying-in,

in, used a little warm by means of cloths made wet with it, and applied constantly.

SPIRITUS VINOSUS RECTIFICATUS. Stimulant, 3*fls* ad 3*ij*. Of this 100 parts contain 95 of alkohol, and 5 of distilled water. Externally rectified spirit, joined with as much camphor as it will dissolve, is useful in those inflammations of the hands or feet, termed chilblains.

SPIRITUS VINOSUS TENUIOR. Proof-spirit. This, it appears, has little more than half the strength of the former, 100 parts containing 55 of alkohol, and 45 of distilled water.

SPONGIA, (æ, f.) Sponge. Externally to stop hæmorrhages. When used as a tent for dilating wounds and ulcers, it is previously dipped in melted wax, and the wax squeezed out of it in a press.

SPONGIA USTA. Antacid, absorbent; in scrofulous complaints, &c. 3*fls* ad 3*j*, or more, bis terve die. In bronchocele burnt sponge has sometimes proved effectual, 3*j* or 3*fls* being made into a lozenge, and held under the tongue till dissolved, and then swallowed, every night, for some weeks.

STANNI PULVIS. Powder of tin. Anthelmintic, to children gr. x ad 3*ij*, to adults 3*j* ad 3*ij*, or more, bis terve die; a mercurial cathartic being occasionally interposed.

STAPHISAGRIA, (æ, f.) *semen.* Stavesacre. Acrid, emetic, cathartic, gr. iij ad gr. x. Also externally against the itch, vermin, &c. When employed for the

the destruction of pediculi, it is best applied, mixed in a small proportion with hair-powder.

STRAMONIUM, (i, n.) *berba*. Thornapple. E. Narcotic; in mania, epilepsy, and various other spasmodic diseases, in powder gr. j ad gr. x, insipidated juice gr. $\frac{1}{4}$ ad gr. iij, bis terve die.

STYRAX (äcis, m. vel f.) PURIFICATA, *resina*. Stimulant, balsamic, gr. x ad 3fs. Also externally, joined with a double proportion of black basilicon, (see *Pix liq.*) against paralytic numbnesses, and debility of the limbs following rickets.

SUCCINUM PRÆPARATUM. Prepared amber. Anti-spasmodic, corroborant, 3j ad 5j. See *Oleum & Sal*.

SUCCUS (i, m.) ACONITI SPISSATUS. E. Gr. $\frac{1}{4}$ ad gr. iij, or more, bis terve die. For its virtues and uses, see *Aconitum*.

SUCCUS BACCÆ SAMBUCI SPISSATUS. Aperient, deobstruent, 3fs ad 3fss. Diluted with water, it is often used with advantage in common colds.

SUCCUS BELLADONNÆ SPISSATUS. E. Gr. $\frac{1}{4}$ ad gr. iij, or more, bis terve die. For its virtues and uses, see *Belladonna*.

SUCCUS CICUTÆ SPISSATUS. (*Vulgo, Extr. cicutæ.*) Narcotic, alterative, resolvent; in scrofula, periodic headachs, &c. Begin with gr. iij, twice or thrice a day, and then increase the dose gradually according to its effects. Patients in general, says Dr. Cullen, will bear a greater dose at night than at noon, and at noon than in the morning.

SUCCUS COCHLEĀRΙÆ COMPOSITUS. (*Suc. cochl. hort. libij;—beccabungæ,—nasturtii aquat. sing. libj;—aurant. Hisp. 3xx.*) Stimulant, attenuant, aperient, diuretic; in cutaneous defædations, &c. 3j ad 3iv, bis terve die.

SUCCUS HYOSCYĀMI SPISSĀTUS. *E.* In chorees resulting the use of opium, &c. gr. j ad gr. v, or more, bis terve die. In puerperal mania, &c. gr. iij ad gr. xv, or more.—For its further uses and qualities, see *Hyoscyamus*.

SUCCUS LACTŪCÆ VIRŌSÆ SPISSĀTUS. *E.* Narcotic, aperient, diuretic; in dropfies proceeding from visceral obstructions, &c. gr. iij ad 3j, or more, bis terve die. By gradually increasing the dose, Dr. Collin, of Vienna, has given it to the extent even of 3iii, in twenty-four hours.

SUCCUS LIMŌNIS SPISSĀTUS. *L.* Cooling, anti-septic; to allay heat and thirst in bilious inflammatory disorders, 3j ad 3ij, ad libitum.

SUCCUS RIBIS NIGRI SPISSĀTUS. *L.* Subacid, cooling, 3ls ad 3j. Also to moisten the mouth and fauces with, in sore throats and fevers.

SULPHUR (*ūris, n.*) ANTIMONII PRÆCIPITĀTUM. Alterative, diaphoretic, gr. j ad gr. iv, bis terve die. See *Pilulæ*.

SULPHŪRIS FLORES. Cathartic, diaphoretic. But the washed flowers of sulphur, and the subsequent preparation only are suited for internal use. Externally antipsoric. See *Ung.*

SULPHUR PRÆCIPITĀTUM. *L.* Laxative, diaphoretic,

retic, 3j ad 3ij. A lotion, says Mr. Bell, consisting of precipitated sulphur 3ij, acetated ceruse 3j, rose-water 3vij, used night and morn, has proved often effectual in curing that herpetic eruption in the face, to which some persons, especially females, are liable.

SYRUPUS ACETI. *E.* (*Aceti vini, p. libijss; sacch. purif. libijss.* Boil so as to form a syrup.) Cooling, antiseptic, 3j ad 3ij.

SYRUPUS ALTHÆÆ. Emollient, demulcent; against tickling coughs, &c. 3j ad 3ij, or more.

SYRUPUS CARYOPHILLI RUBRI. Aromatic, 3j ad 3ij. This is chiefly valued on account of its fine red colour, which however is destructible by alkaline salts.

SYRUPUS COLCHICI. *E.* (*Rad. colchici recentis, succulentæ, in frustæ tenuia sectæ, 3j; aceti, p. 3xvj; sacch. purif. 3xxvj.* Macerate the root in the vinegar two days, now and then shaking the vessel; then strain it with a gentle pressure; to the strained liquor add the sugar, and boil a little, so as to form a syrup.) Acrid, diuretic; in dropsy, &c. 3j gradually increased to 3j, or more, bis die.

SYRUPUS CORTICIS AURANTII. Stomachic, 3j ad 3ij, or more.

SYRUPUS CROCI. *L.* Cordial, 3j ad 3ij, or more. — This gives a fine colour to julaps.

SYRUPUS LIMONIS SUCCI. (*Succi limon. libij; sacch. purif. 3l.*) Cooling, in bilious inflammatory disorders, gastritis, &c. 3j ad 3ij.

SYRUPUS MÖRI, L.—RIBIS NIGRI, L.—RUBI IDÆI. L. Grateful, cooling, 3j ad 3ss. Sheathed with some mucilaginous fluid, these are useful for soreness of the mouth and tonsils.

SYRUPUS PAPAVÉRIS ALBI. (*Olim, Syr. e meconio.*) Anodyne, hypnotic, to children 3j ad 3ij, to adults 3is ad 3j, or more. One oz. is esteemed equal to gr. j of opium.

SYRUPUS PAPAVÉRIS ERRATÍCI. L. Slightly anodyne, 3j ad 3ij, or more.

SYRUPUS ROSÆ. To children laxative, 3ij ad 3ss.

SYRUPUS ROSARUM RUBRARUM. E. (*Petalorum rosæ rubræ sic. 3vij; aquæ bullientis, p. libv; sacch. purif. libvj.* Infuse the roses in the water for a night, then boil them a little; strain out the liquor, and adding to it the sugar, boil them to the consistence of a syrup.) Subastrigent, 3j ad 3ij. It is chiefly valued on account of its fine red colour.

SYRUPUS SCILLITÍCUS. E. (*Aceti scillæ, p. libij; sacch. purif. ibiijss.* Dissolve the sugar with a gentle heat, so as to form a syrup.) Expectorant, diuretic, 3j ad 3ij, or more.

SYRUPUS SIMPLEX, SIVE COMMUNIS. E. (*Sacch. purif. partes xv; aquæ partes viij.* Let the sugar be dissolved by a gentle heat, and boil a little, so as to form a syrup.)

SYRUPUS SPINÆ CERVINÆ. Cathartic, 3ss ad 3is. Except in clysters, this is now seldom employed.

SYRUPUS TOLUTÁNUS. (*Vice Syr. balsam.*) Balsamic; for coughs, &c. 3j ad 3ij.

SYRUPUS

SYRUPUS VIOLÆ. To infants a tea-spoonful or two, gently laxative.

SYRUPUS ZINGIBERIS. Carminative, stomachic, ʒj ad ʒiij.

TAMARINDUS, (i, f.) *fructus*. The tamarind-tree. Acid, cooling, laxative, pulp ʒſs ad ʒiſs. See *Infusum*.

TANACETUM, (i, n.) *flos, herba*. Tanfy. Tonic, deobſtruent, stomachic, ʒſs ad ʒj. Also in infusion.

TARAXACUM, (i, n.) *radix, herba*. Dandelion. Tonic, aperient, diuretic, resolvent; in cases of obstructed liver, jaundice, &c. juice ʒj ad ʒiij, or more, ter quaterve die. Also in decoction, ʒiij boiled in water ſbiſs to ʃbj, to which, when strained, is added vitriolated kali ʒiij,—doſe, a tea cupful, every two hours, until it operates.

TARTARI CRYSTALLI, (orum, f.) Cooling, laxative, diuretic, ʒj ad ʒiij, bis terve die. Cathartic, diuretic; in dropſies, &c. ʒſs ad ʒj, or more, every or every other morn, diſſolved in water 10 or 12 oz. and taken, partitis viſibus.

TEREBINTHINA CHIA. L. Stimulant, corroborant, diuretic, detergent; in gleets, fluor albus, &c. ʒj ad ʒj, bis terve die.

TEREBINTHINA VENETA. E. Virtues as the preceding; but, having no aromatic flavour, it is more nauseous to the taste. In clyſters laxative, ʒſs ad ʒj, ſuspended in ſome watery vehicle, by means of yolk of egg. Thus given, ſays Dr. Cullen, we have found it to be one of the moſt certain laxatives that could be

be employed in colics, and other cases of obstinate costiveness.

TEREBINTHINA VULGĀRIS. *L.* Stimulant, diuretic, detergent, gr. xv ad 3ij, bis terve die. In clysters laxative, 3fs ad 3j, prepared as the former. Externally stimulant, rubefacient.

THŪS, (*ūris, n.*) *resīna*. Frankincense. *L.* Stimulant, corroborant, gr. x ad 3fs. Externally in plasters, stimulant, strengthening. See *Empl.*

THÝMUS, (*i, m.*) *herba*. Common thyme. Stimulant, aromatic, gr. x ad 3fs.

TINCTŪRA ALÖËS. (*Aloes soc. 3fs; extr. glycyrrh. 3iss; aq. dist. spir. vin. ten. sing. 3j.*) Purgative, stomachic, 3fs ad 3is.

TINCTŪRA ALÖËS COMPOSĪTA. (*Aloes soc. croci, sing. gr. xlv; tinct. myrrhae 3j.*) Stimulant, aperient, stomachic, emmenagogue, 3fs ad 3ij, bis terve die.

TINCTŪRA ALÖËS VITRIOLĀTA. *E.* (*Aloes soc. myrrhae, sing. 3iss; croci 3j; spir. ætheris vitriolici, p. libj.* Digest the myrrh with the spirit four days, in a close vessel, then add the aloes and saffron; digest again four days, and when the feces have subsided, pour off the clear.) Stimulant, antispasmodic, aperient, stomachic; in spasmodic pains of the stomach, &c. 3fs ad 3is, bis terve die.

TINCTŪRA ASÆ FŒTIDÆ. (*Asæ fætidæ 3j; spir. vin. rect. 3j.*) Stimulant, antispasmodic, 3fs ad 3is, or more.

TINCTŪRA AURANTII CORTICIS. *L.* (*Cort. ext.*

currant. rec. 3jss; spir. vin. ten. 3ij.) Tonic, stomachic, 3j ad 3ij, or more.

TINCTURA BALSAMP PERUVIANA. *L. (Bals. Peru. 3j; spir. vin. rec. 3ss.) Stimulant, attenuant, 3ss ad 3ifs.*

TINCTURA BALSAMI TOLUTANI. *(Bals. Tolut. 3iss; spir. vīn. rec. 3ij.) Stimulant, corroborant, expectorant, 3ss ad 3ij.*

TINCTURA BENZOES COMPOSITA. *(Benz. 3iss; sly-raxis 3j; bals. Tolut. 3ss; aloes soc. gr. xv; spir. vin. rec. 3ij.) Stimulant, expectorant, antispasmodic, stomachic, 3ss ad 3j, or more, bis terve die. Also externally to languid ulcers, and as a covering to the aperture made in the skin by certain compound fractures.*

TINCTURA CANTHARIDIS. *(Canthar. gr. v; coccinell. gr. j $\frac{1}{2}$; spir. vin. ten. 3j.) Acrid, stimulant, diuretic, gt. x ad gt. xxx, or more, ter quaterve die. This, it seems, has been considered by the late Dr. Farr as an efficacious medicine against the hydropic complaints of old people; to whom he was wont to prescribe it, joined with a little milk of ammoniac and camphorated tincture of opium, when the breathing was affected. Also externally to sinuses and fistulous openings, in the way of injection, diluted with water, in the proportion of three or four dr. to flj.*

TINCTURA CARDAMOMI. *(Sem. cardam. 3iss; spir. vin. ten. 3ij.) Stimulant, carminative, 3j ad 3ij. This is not unfrequently employed as a corrector to medicines of the cold aperient class.*

TINCTURA CARDAMOMI COMPOSITA. L. (*Sem. cardam.—carui, coccinel. sing. gr. xv; cinnam. 3ss; uvarum passarum, demptis acinis, 3ss; spir. vin. ten. 3iv.*) Stimulant, stomachic, 3j ad 3ij.

TINCTURA CASCARILLÆ. L. (*Cascarillæ 3j; spir. vin. ten. 3j.*) Stimulant, tonic; in laxity and debility of the stomach and bowels, &c. 3j ad 3ss, ter quaterve die.

TINCTURA CASTÖRÆ. (*Castorei Russ. 3ss; spir. vin. ten. 3j.*) Antispasmodic, 3j ad 3ij, or more.

TINCTURA CASTÖRÆ COMPOSITA. E. (*Castorei Russ. 3j; asæ fætidæ 3ss; spir. ammoniæ, p. libj.* Digest six days, in a close vessel, and strain.) Stimulant, antispasmodic; in hysterical complaints, &c. 3ss ad 3j, or more.

TINCTURA CATECHU. (*Catechu 3iss; cinnam. 3j; spir. vin. ten. 3ij.*) Astringent; in diarrhoeas, &c. 3j ad 3iij.

TINCTURA CINCHONÆ, SIVE CORTICIS PERUVIANI. (*Cinch. 3iss; spir. vin. ten. 3j.*) Tonic, stomachic, 3ss ad 3ss.

TINCTURA CINCHONÆ, SIVE CORTICIS PERUVIANI, AMMONIATA. L. (*Cinch. 3j; spir. ammoniæ comp. 3j.* Digest ten days, in a close vessel, and strain.) Stimulant, tonic, 3ss ad 3ij.

TINCTURA CINCHONÆ, SIVE CORTICIS PERUVIANI, COMPOSITA. L. (*Cinch. gr. xlviij; cort. aurant. excic. gr. xxxvij; serpentariae gr. ix; croci gr. iij; coccinel. gr. ij; spir. vin. ten. 3j.*) Tonic, stimulant, stomachic, 3j ad 3ij.

TINCTURA CINNAMOMI. (*Cinnam.* 3*ss*; *spir.* *vin.* *ten.* 3*j.*) Stimulant, astringent, stomachic, 3*j* ad 3*iiij.*

TINCTURA CINNAMOMI COMPOSITA. (*Cinnam.* 3*ss*; *sem. cardam.* gr. *xlv*; *piperis longi,* *zingib.* *sing.* 3*ss*; *spir.* *vin.* *ten.* 1*bs*.) Stimulant, carminative, stomachic, 3*ss* ad 3*j*, or more.

TINCTURA COLOMBÆ. (*Colombæ* gr. *xxxvijss*; *spir.* *vin.* *ten.* 3*j.*) Tonic, stomachic; in bilious vomitings and purgings, &c. 3*j* ad 3*iiij.*

TINCTURA CROCI. E. (*Croci* 3*j.*; *spir.* *vin.* *ten.* P. 3*xv.* Digest five days, and filter through paper.) Cordial, diaphoretic, 3*ss* ad 3*j*, or more.

TINCTURA FERRI AMMONIACALIS. L. (*Ferri ammon.* 3*j*; *spir.* *vin.* *ten.* 3*j.* Digest, and strain.) Astringent, tonic, aperient, gt. *xv* ad 3*j*, bis terve die. Also externally to scirrhouus tumours, a linen rag being kept moist with it, and constantly applied.

TINCTURA FERRI MURIATI. (*Vice Tinct. Mart. in spiritu salis.*) Astringent, tonic, gt. *x* ad gt. *xx*, or more, bis terve die. In cases of dysury depending on spasm, attended with stricture of the urethra, this, which of all the preparations of iron is the most astringent, Mr. Cline recommends to be given, every fifteen minutes, in the quantity of gt. *x* or *xv*, till nausea and symptoms of general relaxation take place. Also externally to scirrhouus tumours, and to destroy venereal warts.

TINCTURA GALBANI. L. (*Galbani* 3*ss*; *spir.* *vin.* *ten.* 3*j.*) Stimulant, antispasmodic; in hysteria, flatulencies, and the asthmatic complaints of old people, 3*j* ad 3*iiij.*

TINCTURA GENTIANÆ COMPOSITA. (*Gentianæ 3ss;*
cort. aurant. exsic. gr. xv; sem. cardam. gr. viij;
spir. vin. ten. 3j.) Tonic, stomachic, 3j ad 3iij, bis
 terve die.

TINCTURA GUAJACI. E. (*Guaiaci gummi-resinæ lbj;*
spir. vin. rect. p. libjs. Digest ten days, and strain.)
 Stimulant, diaphoretic; in chronic rheumatism,
 gout, &c. 3ss ad 3ijs, or more, bis terve die.

TINCTURA GUAIACI AMMONIATA. (*Guaiaci gummi-*
resinæ 3j; spir. ammoniæ comp. 3vj.) Stimulant, dia-
 phoretic, antispasmodic; against chronic rheuma-
 tism, wandering gout, &c. 3j ad 3ij, or more, bis
 die.

TINCTURA HELLÉBÓRI NIGRI. (*Helleb. nigri 3j;*
coccinel. gr. j $\frac{1}{2}$; spir. vin. ten. 3j.) Alterative, at-
 tenuant, and in plethoric habits emmenagogue, 3ss
 ad 3ijs, bis terve die.

TINCTURA JALAPII. (*Jalap. 3ss; spir. vin. ten.*
3ij.) Cathartic, 3j ad 3iij.

TINCTURA KÍNO. E. (*Kino 3ij; spir. vin. ten. p.*
lbis. Digest eight days, and strain.) Astringent;
 in diarrheas, lientery, &c. 3j ad 3ij, ter quaterve
 die.

TINCTURA MOSCHI. E. (*Moschi 3j; spir. vin. rect.*
p. 3vj. Digest ten days, and strain.) Stimulant, dia-
 phoretic, antispasmodic, 3j ad 3ij, or more.

TINCTURA MYRRHÆ. (*Myrrhæ 3j; spir. vin. ten.*
3j; spir. vin. rect. 3ij. Dij.) Stimulant, attenuant,
 3ss ad 3ijs, or more. In gargles detergent, 3j in lbj.
 Also externally for cleansing foul ulcers, and pro-
 moting the exfoliation of carious bones.

TINCTURA OPII. (*Opii gr. iv $\frac{2}{3}$; spir. vin. ten. 3j.*) Anodyne, narcotic, gt. xv ad gt. xxx, or more. Twenty drops are about equal to gr. j of opium.

TINCTURA OPII CAMPHORATA. (*Opii, flor. benzoes, sing. gr. j $\frac{2}{3}$; camph. gr. j $\frac{1}{2}$; ol. anisi essent. p. gr. j $\frac{2}{3}$; spir. vin. ten. 3j.*) Anodyne, diaphoretic; against tickling coughs, &c. 3ss ad 3ii, or more.

TINCTURA RHABARBARI. (*Rhabarb. 3ss; cardam. gr. vijss; croci gr. iij $\frac{1}{2}$; spir. vin. ten. 3j.*) Purgative, stomachic, 3ss ad 3ii. Aperient, stomachic, 3ij ad 3ii.

TINCTURA RHABARBARI COMPOSITA. L. (*Rhabarb. 3ss; rad. glycyrrb. gr. vijss; zingib. croci, sing. gr. iij $\frac{1}{2}$; aq. dist. 3ss; spir. vin. ten. 3iij.*) Purgative, stomachic, 3ss ad 3ii. This makes an useful addition to the bark for the cure of intermittents, where the viscera are obstructed.

TINCTURA RHEI CUM ALOE. E. (*Rhabarbari 3j 3ij; aloes fac. 3j; sem. cardam. 3ij; spir. vin. ten. p. 3v.* Digest seven days, and strain.) Purgative, stomachic, 3ss ad 3j.

TINCTURA RHEI AMARA. E. (*Rhabarbari 3ij 3ij; gentianæ 3ij; serpentariae Virg. gr. x; spir. vin. ten. p. 3v.* Digest seven days, and strain.) Tonic, stomachic, aperient, 3j ad 3iij, bis terve die. Purgative, stomachic, 3ss ad 3ii.

TINCTURA RHEI DULCIS. E. (This is made by adding to two pounds and a half of tincture of rhubarb 3iv of sugar-candy.)

TINCTURA SABINÆ COMPOSITA. L. (*Extr. sabinæ*

binæ 3js; tinct. castorei 3j; tinct. myrrhæ 3js.) Stimulant, antispasmodic, emmenagogue, gt. xx ad 3j, or more, bis die.

TINCTURA SCILLÆ. L. (*Scill. exsic. gr. xv; spir. vin. ten. 3ij.*) Expectorant, diuretic, attenuant, gt. xv ad gt. lx.

TINCTURA SENNÆ. (*Sennæ 3ij; carui gr. xxijss; cardam. gr. vijss; uvar. pass. 3js; spir. vin. ten. 3iv.*) Carminative, cathartic, 3js ad 3j, or more.

TINCTURA SERPENTARIIÆ. (*Serpent. Virg. 3jss; spir. vin. ten. 3ij.*) Tonic, stimulant, diaphoretic; to remove periodic headaches, &c. 3j ad 3ij, or more.

TINCTURA VALERIANÆ. L. (*Valerianæ 3j; spir. vin. ten. 3j.*) Antispasmodic; against nervous languors, &c. 3ij ad 3js.

TINCTURA VALERIANÆ AMMONIATA. (*Valerianæ 3j; spir. ammonia comp. 3j.*) Stimulant, antispasmodic, 3j ad 3ij.

TINCTURA VERATRI. E. (*Hellebori albi 3vij; spir. vin. ten. p. libjss.* Digest ten days, and filter through paper.) Stimulant, alterative, deobstruent; in cutaneous diseases, epilepsy, &c. gt. x ad gt. 1, in a little valerian tea, bis terve die. Emetic, cathartic; in mania, &c. 3j ad 3ij. As this is a medicine of great activity, it is prudent, when given as an alternative, to begin with small doses, increasing them gradually according to their effects. Some suppose it to constitute a part of Maredant's Drops.

TINCTURA ZINGIBERIS. (*Zingib. 3js; spir. vin. ten. 3j.*)

3j. Digest, eight days, with a gentle heat, and strain.)
Stimulant, carminative, stomachic, **3j ad 3ij.**

TORMENTILLA, (*x, f.*) *radix.* Septfoil. Strongly astringent, slightly aromatic, **9j ad 9ij, or 3ss ad 3iiij** of a decoction, made by boiling **3ss** in water **1biiij to 1bij,** ter quaterve die.

TRAGACANTHA, (*æ, f.*) *gummi.* Demulcent. This is much more mucilaginous than gum Arabic, **3j** of which scarcely gives an equal consistence to **1bj** of water, as **3j** of tragacanth. See *Mucil.*

TRICHOMANES, (*is, m.*) *herba.* Maidenhair. *E.* Subastringent, expectorant, demulcent; in decoction or infusion **3j ad 3ij,** with a little liquorice, ter quaterve die.

TRIFOLIUM PALUDOSUM, *herba.* Buckbean. Tonic, laxative, diuretic, deobstruent; in rheumatic complaints, &c. **3ss ad 3j,** in infusion, with a little orange-peel, **3j ad 3ijj,** bis terve die. In some cutaneous diseases, of the herpetic or seemingly cancerous kind, says Dr. Cullen, I have had several instances of the good effects of this plant, taken by infusion in the manner of tea.

TRÖCHISCI AMYLI. (*Amyli 3j; glycyrrb. 3ss; iridis 9j; sacch. purif. 3ss; mucil. tragacanthæ q. s.*) Pectoral; for tickling coughs, **3j ad 3ij.**

TRÖCHISCI CRETÆ. (*Cretæ præp. 3ss; cancri chelar. præp. 3ij; cinnam. 3ss; sacch. pur. 3iiij; mucil. gum. Arab. q. s.*) Antacid; against cardialgy, &c. **3j ad 3ij.**

TRÖCHISCI GLYCRRHIZÆ. (*Extr. glycyrrb. sacch. fur.*

pur. sing. 3x; tragacanthæ 3ij; aq. dist. q. s.) Demulcent; against tickling coughs, 3j ad 3ij.

TRÖCHÍSCI GLYCYRRHÍZÆ CUM OPIO. E. (*Opii purif. 3ij; tinct. bals. Tolut. p. 3ss; syrapi simpl. p. 3vij; extracti glycyrrhizæ, aqua callida molliti, 3v; Arab. gummi 3v.* Rub the opium with the tincture until it is dissolved, then add by degrees the syrup, and extract of liquorice softened with warm water; whilst beating them diligently, gradually sprinkle the gum Arabic powdered; and exsiccate so as to form troches, each weighing gr. x.) Pectoral, anodyne; for tickling coughs, &c. j, ij, or more. One dr. contains nearly gr. j of opium.

TRÖCHÍSCI MAGNESIÆ. L. (*Magnesiæ usæ 3iv; sacch. pur. 3ij; zingib. 3j; mucil. gum. Arab. q. s.)* Antacid, laxative; against cardialgæ attended with costiveness, 3j ad 3ij, or more.

TRÖCHÍSCI NITRI. (*Nitri 3j; sacch. pur. 3j; tragacanthæ gr. iij $\frac{1}{2}$; aq. dist. q. s.)* Cooling, diuretic; in inflammatory sore throats where vicidity prevails, &c. 3j ad 3ij. With a view of obviating uneasiness at stomach, diluting copiously at the same time ought to be enjoined.

TRÖCHÍSCI SULPHURIS. L. (*Flor. sulph. lotor. 3ss; sacch. pur. 3j; mucil. sem. cydonii mali q. s.)* Laxative, diaphoretic; in cases of piles, &c. 3j ad 3ij, or more.

TUSSILAGO, (iris, f.) herba. Colts-foot. Sub-astringent, expectorant, demulcent; for coughs, phthisis, scrofula, &c. expressed juice 3ij ad 3iv, daily.

daily. Also in decoction or infusion. What is sold under the name of *British Herb Tobacco* consists principally of the leaves of this plant.

TUTIA PRÆPARATA. Prepared tutty. Externally astringent; in collyria, unguents, &c. See *Ung.* This is supposed to be useful only from the zinc it contains.

ULMUS, (i. f.) *cortex interior*. The elm-tree. Mucilaginous, astringent, 3*j* ad 3*j*. See *Decoct.*

UNGUENTUM ADIPIS SUILLÆ. L. To soften and heal cracks of the skin, &c.

UNGUENTUM AERUGINIS. E. (*Ung. resinæ flavæ partes xv; aeruginis partem j.*) Tonic, detergent; for cleansing foul ulcers, and keeping down fungous flesh. When weakened by the addition of some simple ointment, it is employed also in scrofulous ophthalmies, where the palpebræ are principally affected.

UNGUENTUM CALCIS HYDRARGYRI ALBÆ. L. (*Calc. hydrarg. alb. 3ij; ung. adipis suillæ 3j.*) Detergent; against cutaneous foulnesses, scabby eruptions about the head, &c.

UNGUENTUM CANTHARIDIS. To keep blisters open. Being made with a decoction of the fly, this occasions less pain, yet answers its purpose no less effectually than the *ceratum cantharidis*.

UNGUENTUM CERÆ. (*Cerae albæ 3iv; sperm. ceti 3ij; ol. olivæ 1b*j*.*) Emollient; against excoriations, cracks, &c.

UNGUENTUM CERUSSÆ, E. (*Ung. simpl. partes v; cerusse*

cerussæ partem j.) Cooling, desiccative; for excoriations and other similar frettings of the skin.

UNGuentum CERUSSÆ ACETATÆ. (*Cerussæ acetatæ ʒj; ceræ albæ ʒj; ol. olivæ ʒiv.*) Cooling, desiccative.

UNGuentum ELEMi COMPOSITUM. L. (*Elemi ℔j; terebinth. vulg. ʒx; sevi ovilli ℔ij; ol. olivæ ʒij.*) Digestive, cleansing to foul ulcers.

UNGuentum HELLÉBÖRI ALBI. L. (*Helleb. alb. ʒj; ung. adipis suillæ ʒiv; ol. limonis effent. p. Ʒjs.*) Antipboric.

UNGuentum HYDRARGYRI FORTIUS. (*Olim, Ung. cœrul. fort.*) Alterative, Өj ad ʒj, rubbed (before the fire) into the legs, or inside of the thighs, every night, or oftener, if circumstances require. Also discutient, resolvent. Of this preparation two dr. contain one of quicksilver.

UNGuentum HYDRARGYRI MITIUS. (*Olim, Ung. cœrul. mit.*) Discutient, resolvent; against pediculi, &c. Six dr. contain one of quicksilver.

UNGuentum HYDRARGYRI NITRATI. (*Olim, Ung. citrinum.*) Stimulant, detergent. Applied by means of a pencil brush, every night, it is useful against psorophthalmy, or inflammation and ulceration of the eyelids. Of this preparation one dr. contains gr. iv of quicksilver, and gr. viij of nitrous acid.

UNGuentum HYDRARGYRI NITRATI MITIUS. E. (This is made in the same manner as the former, with double the quantity of lard.) Stimulant, &c. to venereal, scrofulous, or phagedænic ulcers. One dr.

dr. contains gr. ij of quicksilver, and gr. iv of nitrous acid.

UNGENTUM P̄CIS. (*Picis liq. sevi ovilli ppti, sing. ʒj.*) Detergent; against cutaneous foulnesses, scabby crusts, &c.

UNGENTUM SIMPLEX. E. (*Ol. olivæ partes v; ceræ albæ partes ij.*) Softening, healing to chaps, &c.

UNGENTUM RESINÆ FLAVÆ. (*Resinæ flavæ, ceræ flav. sing. ʒvj; ol. olivæ lbs.*) Digestive, cleansing to wounds and ulcers.

UNGENTUM SAMBUCI. L. Cooling, emollient.

UNGENTUM SPERMATIS CETI. (*Sperm. ceti ʒvj; ceræ alb. 3ij; ol. olivæ ʒiij.*) This differs little from the ointment of wax, except in regard to consistence.

UNGENTUM SULPHURIS. (*Ung. adipis suillæ lbs; flor. sulph. ʒiv.*) Antipsoric, ʒij ad ʒiij, every night.

UNGENTUM TUTIÆ. (*Tutiae pptæ ʒj; ung. sperm. ceti q. s.*) Astringent;—applied to sore eyelids, it serves to keep them from being glued together during sleep.

UNGENTUM ZINCI. E. (*Ung. simpl. partes sex; zinci calcinati partem j.*) Astringent. This is useful in affections of the eyes, or eyelids, where the redness arises from relaxation rather than from active inflammation.

URTICA, (æ, f.) *herba*. Stinging nettle. Cooling, laxative, diuretic, expressed juice ʒij ad ʒiv, daily.

UVA (æ, f.) *PASSA*. The raisin. Demulcent.

UVA (æ, f.) *URSI, folium*. Bear's wortleberry. Astringent; in calculous and nephritic complaints,

in that state of gonorrhœa where the irritability of the bladder is greatly excited, and the urine is loaded with viscid matter, &c. gr. x ad 3ij, in infusion 3j ad 3ss, or more, ter quaterve die.

VALERIĀNA SYLVESTRIS, radix. Wild valerian. Antispasmodic; in epileptic, hysterical and other spasmodic complaints, 3ss ad 3j, or more, in infusion 3j ad 3ij, bis terve die. See *Tinaz*. By giving 3ss, twice a day, the cure of a case of catalepsy has been effected, when smaller doses had been tried in vain.

VERBĀSCUM, (i, n.) folia. Mullein. E. Sub-astringent, demulcent; in diarrhoeas, dysenteries, &c. 3ij ad 3iv, every three hours, of a decoction made by boiling 3ij in water 1biji to 1bij.

VĪNUM ALBUM HISPĀNUM. Spanish whitewine. Cordial, stimulant.

VĪNUM ALŌES. (*Aloes* soc. 3ss; *canellæ albæ* gr. vijss; *wini albi* 3vj; *spir. vin. ten.* 3ij.) Purgative, stomachic; in phlegmatic, paralytic and apoplectic cases, 3ss ad 3ss. Aperient, stomachic, 3j ad 3ij, bis terve die. A dessert or large spoonful, taken repeatedly about noon and at bedtime, with 3j of compound spirit of lavender, is said to have been often beneficial in dyspepsy and cephalalgy.

VĪNUM ANTIMONIŪ. Emetic, 3ij ad 3ss. Alternative, diaphoretic, gt. x ad gt. l, or more.

VĪNUM ANTIMONIŪ TARTĀRISĀTI. (*Antim. tartar.* gr. v; *aquæ dist. feru.* 3ij; *wini albi* 3j. Dissolve the tartarised antimony in the boiling water, then add the wine.) Emetic, 3ij ad 3vj. Febrifuge, dia-phoretic, gt. xv ad 3j.

VINUM FERRI. L. (*Ferri ramentorum 3j; vini albi 1bj.*) Astringent, tonic, deobstruent; in relaxed solids, 3ij ad 3vj, bis terce die.

VINUM GENTIANÆ COMPOSITUM. E. (*Gentianæ 3ss; cinchonæ 3j; cort. aurant. Hisp. sic. 3ij; canellæ albæ 3j; spir. vin. ten. p. 3iv; vini albi Hisp. p. 1bjss.* First pour on the spirit, and after twenty-four hours add the wine; then macerate three days, and strain.) Tonic, stomachic, 3ij ad 3vj, bis terce die.

VINUM IPECACUANHÆ. (*Ipecac. 3ss; vini albi 3j.*) Emetic, 3js ad 3ijs. Febrifuge, diaphoretic; in uterine haemorrhages, coughs, haemoptysis, diarrhoea, dysentery, &c. gt. xij ad gt. xl, or more.

VINUM NICOTIANÆ. E. (*Folior. nicotianæ 3j; vini albi Hisp. p. 1bj.* Digest seven days, and strain.) Narcotic, diuretic, expectorant; in dropsy, dysury, &c. gt. xxx ad gt. lxxx, or more, two hours before dinner and at bedtime, the dose being $\frac{1}{2}$ less in the forenoon than in the evening.

VINUM RHABARBARI. (*Rhabarb. 3ijs; cardam. 3ss; croci gr. xv; vini albi 3iv; spir. vin. ten. 3j.*) Purgative, stomachic; in colics arising from acid viscid phlegm, and diarrhoeas from similar causes, 3js ad 3ijs, or more.

VIOLA, (æ, f.) *flos recens.* The violet. See Syr.

VIPERA, (æ, f.) The viper. E. Restorative; in scrofula, leprous, rheumatic and other chronic diseases, in broth half of one or a whole one, daily.

VITRUM (i, n.) ANTIMONII CERATUM. E. (*Cerae flavæ 3j; vitri antimonii 3j.* Melt the wax in an iron vessel, and throw into it the glass of antimony powdered,

powdered, keep the mixture over a gentle fire, for fifteen minutes, stirring it constantly; then pour it on paper, and when cold, grind it into powder.) Diaphoretic, generally purgative, sometimes emetic; in dysenteries, &c. gr. iiij ad gr. xij, or more, every or every other morn, fasting, with an opiate occasionally at bedtime. According to Dr. Moseley, both the safety and efficacy of this preparation greatly depend on the patient's favouring a determination to the skin by keeping in bed, or not exposing himself to the air, at the times of taking it.

WINTERĀNUS CORTEX, (īcis, m. vel f.) Winter's bark. *E.* Stimulant, aromatic, stomachic, gr. x ad 3ij. This has been reckoned the same with canella alba; but there is an obvious difference between them, both in appearance and quality. Winter's bark tastes much warmer and more pungent.

ZEDOĀRIA, (æ, f.) *radix*. Zedoary. Stimulant, aromatic, stomachic; in hysterick and what are called windy colics, &c. gr. x ad 3ij, in infusion 3j ad 3ijs, bis terve die.

ZINCUM (i, n.) **CALCINĀTUM**. (*Olim, Flor. zinci.*) Astringent, antispasmodic; in epileptic and other spasmodic complaints, gr. iiij ad gr. x, ter quaterve die. Externally, see *Ung.*

ZINCUM VITRIOLOĀTUM PURIFICĀTUM. (*Vulgo, Sal vitrioli, vel Vitr. alb.*) Astringent, antispasmodic, gr. j ad gr. v, bis terve die. Emetic, gr. vij ad 3ijs. Combined with a third of burnt alum, and given in nauseating or slightly vomiting doses, every morning, fasting, or oftener, dissolved in water 3is, it

it is said to have been of use in hooping-cough, humoral asthmas, infarctions of the lungs, the latter stage of dysentery, &c. and when repeated, once in eight hours, in a quantity sufficient to excite gentle nausea, that haemorrhages from the lungs have likewise been relieved by it. Externally cooling, astrigent; in collyria, injections, &c. gr. x ad ʒſs in ʒvj. Vitriolated zinc ʒj, ointment of hog's lard ʒſs, form an useful remedy for that chronic inflammation of the eyelids, to which old people are subject.

ZINGIBER, (ēris, n.) radix. Ginger. Stimulant, carminative, stomachic; in flatulent colics, &c. gr. v ad ʒj, in infusion ʒj ad ʒij. See Syr. & Tinct.

ZINGIBER CONDITUM. Candied ginger. E. Virtues as the former.
